

Training Committee News Joe Warner: "Let Me Introduce Myself"

As Mick Dundee says, "Please allow me to introduce myself." I am Joe Warner, the club's new training director. Many of the long timers know me but a lot don't as I am mostly at the club on beginner nights. I am sure that is going to change now and I look forward to seeing what others are doing the other six days a week at the club.

My family's history with the club goes back to the 70s when we got a Tom Stodgehill Aussie named C.A. "C" was a pain in the butt being a typical Aussie pup and our vet, Dr. Carpenter,



recommended the club that one of his associates was involved in - DTCDC.

We found our way to the DTCDC where my mom, Mary Warner, trained with Lynda Holman, Maurine Pearson and others. I still have the leather leashes that I made for mom to use while training with C. Mom and C worked for a while, but other interests took mom new directions and I went to college.

Now, years later, my wife Donna and I are wildlife rehabbers and help about 400 to 500 opossums a year. One day one of our prairie dog rehab friends (yes, I know) called and said they were transporting a load of baby Bassets from Mid America Basset Rescue to Austin. They were coming through the area with one pup that was not spoken for. We told them we would like to meet her and so began the story of "The Wild Child," our Ellie Mae. She ate everything of Donna's - closest I have ever been to getting a divorce. Donna told me, "Train that dog or else." So, another unruly monster brought me back to DTDC. Our puppy instructor was Sally Browning. The beginner instructors were Nancy Monson, Peggie Phelps and others I don't remember. We went through five beginner classes before we moved up to Intermediate and met Stella Moore. She scared me to death! We worked hard and I think Stella kind of liked Ellie even though she could not understand the purpose of such a dog. Stella and I became good friends with me assisting her with many classes.

Eventually, it was time for me to start teaching the beginner class and I was not sure about that. I did not feel comfortable until one day a young student with a street pit came and asked for help. The student was in the same situation as I had been with Ellie, having been told train it or lose it. This kid had little hope of saving his best friend but with a little work we got it to sit. Then we got a good heel. Then the light came on in this student's head that he could save his dog. I have been hooked on helping others with their beginner dogs ever since and that is why I am a DTCDC member and teach beginner classes. I have now been teaching beginner class for many years and I love it.

For the club I hope to help each of you find what you love about this club.


Dynadaux From Russia With Love MS CD BN RN














dler Discrimination title with second place and that elements title. She ran a second trial for fun



Tristan earned her first leg in UKC Handlers Discrimination and 3rd place. This is our very first trial in nosework.


Ken Hagmueller and Sandi Myers brag:
