

DTCDC: HOW IT ALL BEGAN

OF CHAINING CHE Tince there was some discussion about our building at the November Club Meeting, I felt this would be a great time to share the history of the January 22, 1974 formation of The Dog Training Club of Dallas County. *There is none better qualified than Lucile Tufte (our Club's "Mother") to tell* you about our Club's "beginnings," and we are lucky that in 1976 she was asked to record such a history. I am proud to share with you a portion of her account (the complete text can be found in our Club scrapbooks). One note to add to Lucile's accounting – she was very humble in her accounting of the "beginnings" of our training building and did not make mention of the fact that she put up her own securities as the collateral to purchase the land and have the building erected. If not for Lucile doing this, we would not have our wonderful building today! I hope you will feel the same sense of pride and amazement that I do when you read Lucile's account and reflect on how our Club has grown and developed over 47 years, always remaining true to its "beginnings" and also making Lucile's dreams for DTCDC to continue into the future become reality.


From Lucile Tufte, September 1976:



Tt has been suggested that our records need an Laccount of the beginnings of The Dog Training Club of Dallas County. I shall attempt to supply such a report from my recollections:

Prior to 1973 dog obedience training was offered in Oak Cliff by the Dallas Obedience Training Club during the summers only and only at the beginner level. Students interested in advanced training were required to go to North Dallas for classes. So, although some trainers were active in Southwest Dallas County, they were few (proof, according to the North Dallas contingent, that "they don't train dogs in Oak Cliff"). The first Monday in May 1973, D.O.T.C. enrolled a remarkable beginner class in Oak Cliff (at the Wynnewood Shopping Center) – most remarkable is that eight of the class indicated they wished to continue to advanced training. Since I had taught the class (as well as prior years' Oak Cliff classes) D.O.T.C.'s training director, Gene Dabney,

proposed that a Novice class be provided for these trainees "at home," as it were. I agreed to teach the class, though, at that time I stated that, while most of these students would probably be willing to transfer training to North Dallas when they graduated from Beginners' Class, I did not believe they would do so at a later stage.

Nevertheless a Novice Class formed in Oak Cliff in July 1973, enrolling Billie Alice Moon and Andy, Sheila Noonan and Boom-Boom, Grace Robinson and Natasha, Judy Schwander and Pepper, Lynda Walker [Holman] and Marquis, Norma Walker and Jean-Paul and Mrs. George Elliott and Asta. In August [1973], with the approach of school, a few 4-H youngsters "sneaked" into the Novice Class. These 4-Hers included Katie Blute and Dixie, Kelly Browning and Junior; Rose Callahan and Lily, and the three Walsleben children -- Dottie with Scooter, Robert with Yum-Yum and Tim with Hamms.

This [Novice] class became a remarkably close-knit, mutually supportive, enthusiastic group.

Seven members of the class were ready for competition by the Texas Kennel Club show in September 1973 (Scooter, Marquis, Natasha, Pepper, Junior, Hamms and Jean-Paul) under judge Ginger Pugh. By D.O.T.C.'s trial December 2, 1973, Scooter and Marquis had finished their C.D. degrees and eight others from the class had "legs" – some had trophies.

Still training in December? In Oak Cliff? Right!! After entering Novice, several new members joined D.O.T.C. -- Mrs. Elliott, B.A. Moon, Sheila Noonan, Grace Robinson, Judy Schwander, Norma and Lynda Walker [Holman] – adding to the Southwest Dallas County representation which already included Bea Barnett, Rose Callahan, Linda Jones, Gloria Nelson and myself. Since there were 14 advanced trainers wishing to continue and since we were able to rent training space at Red Bird Armory at a cost we could, if necessary, meet ourselves, we were permitted to pay our own way and move indoors. We eased the budget by offering a small beginners' class which included (among others) Jim Walsleben and Liza, Ruth Robinson and Domino, Susan Maxwell and Princess and taught by Linda Jones.

[At the January 8, 1974 DOTC meeting, after an unsuccessful attempt to resolve some conflicts, the "Oak Cliff group" resigned their DOTC memberships.] We immediately organized as an indepen-

dent group –GREATER Dallas Obedience Training Club. (Among other considerations, several of us had just paid \$12 for shirts embroidered "Dallas Obedience Training Club." By adding the word Greater, we could make use of the shirts). Our first tasks were organizational on two fronts – first, to devise by-laws and structure for our club which would prevent abuses and problems which we had seen in D.O.T.C. and, second, to develop a training program of our own compatible with our dog training philosophy. A third task took top priority, however: Our rental agreement with Red Bird Armory had been made in the name of D.O.T.C. but was greatly influenced by my personal guarantee for our group's behavior. (I was acquainted with the officer in charge of rental decisions). 1973 found the nation in an "energy crisis" and the State

of Texas had banned the use of National Guard Armories by outside groups as an energy conservation measure. The "management" of Red Bird Armory was pleased to have an excuse to withdraw from its agreement with D.O.T.C. when I advised that I could no longer take personal responsibility for the classes – but they also declined to make a new agreement with us. So, in January 1974, we were "on the street" and had our first experience with what would be an annually more difficult

problem: finding wintertime quarters.

That first winter we were able to use a vacant store, located at Hampton Road and Kiest Blvd. one night a week. We offered a beginner class taught by Linda Jones and advanced training which I taught. During the Spring and Summer of 1974 we met at Kiest Park. Our class (the advanced class only) moved in the Fall to a covered "airplane motel" at Red Bird Airport – for two weeks. It turned out that the person renting us space hadn't full authority to do so – and we were quickly turned out. The subsequent search for quarters took until January 1975. Most of the original club members remained eager to start training again - but most of the new prospects from the summer classes lost enthusiasm and, in effect, we had to make a fresh start after such a long lay-off. We finished the winter of 1975 training in a cold and dusty warehouse located

on Davis Street – with a landlord who propositioned every female he came in contact with. In April 1975, we again moved to Kiest Park – operating now as The Dog Training Club of Dallas County. During this second summer of our independent existence we began real expansion. We increased our number of instructors: Grace Robinson taught her first class at the warehouse; during the summer Lynda Walker [Holman] taught a class in Duncanville, Ruby Walsleben taught a class in DeSoto, Ruth Robinson, Carolyn Cranford and Maurine Leffingwell [Pearson] took Kiest Park Classes.

We also expanded our programs: multiple Beginner classes (including one for the YMCA in Waxahachie); many dogs preparing for their C.D.X. work (the first club dog completing this degree being Grace Robinson's Natasha in the Fall of 1975); and, over a period of several weeks, we developed a special program for young puppies, ages 2 to 5 months which combined obedience training for the puppy and an educational program for the owner. Training now filled three nights a week – and a large group needed training quarters by fall.



Each year we found we had to pay more for progressively less adequate quarters. When Fall 1975 found us paying \$75.00 a week for something less than 1000 useful square feet in an abandoned restaurant on Duncanville's Main Street we examined our goals and our commitment and finally decided in favor of obtaining our own permanent facility. After investigating real

estate for sale, we chose a half-acre plot in Woodland Hills and authorized a builder to construct a 3,000 square foot shell building for us. Walls, roof and floor were completed by December 1975; the first weekend of December club members turned out and installed electricity and applied paint and classes were held in our own training building in the first week of December. The remainder of the winter was spent "finishing" the building. Partitions, plumbing, heat were all installed by club members – with a parking lot and temporary water supply finally added in August 1976. As of this writing we can see major accomplishments: Club membership is in the neighborhood of 50 members - mostly active; training classes are offered four nights a week and cover all levels from puppy classes to utility dogs; our building is effectively complete and will be rented to an outside group (The Great Pyrenees Club) for the first time on September 18th [1976]; our club and its members are recognized, I believe, as a strong force in obedience in the Dallas area.

My personal hope is that coming years will see our attentions directed outwards – to the "fun" aspects of obedience such as drill team, exhibition team and scent hurdle team; to educational efforts; to activities promoting obedience as a sport.

The one thing we no longer have to concern ourselves with is what we have already proved beyond any doubt: They do train dogs in Oak Cliff.

He had the cutest howl he grew into as he got older and loved to talk to us when he wanted something or just to let us know he was there. Snickers was never the pup to do anything competitive, he just enjoyed being around us, protecting us and just letting us love on him all the time.

This once lost and abused dog became my savior. He helped me get through so much- my move to a big new city leaving everything behind, job changes, bad relationships and the biggest thing he helped me with was continuing to deal with the loss of my mom. He let me just hold him and cry and be silly playing and laughing and he even had his own puppy dance. He was always a good sport with letting me dress him up in a scarf on snowy day, to bumble bee wings at Halloween and lights and reindeer ears at Christmas, and a mask at the start of Covid. There was never a night, until the end when he got sick that he didn't sleep at my feet to be near me.

I miss my lil munchkin more than I could have ever imagined. He was my rock through it all until the very end. He was the happiest pup I have ever had and loved everyone and his brother until the end.

Daisy April 1, 2008 - November 30, 2020

Daisy and her sister Blossom entered our lives on May 29, 2008, as 8-10-week-old rescue puppies from Grand Prairie Animal Services. Two days later, and on our anniversary, Daisy broke with Parvo. She barely survived and was quickly noticed by Durango, our then big male Collie. Durango usually ignored our fosters but he began bringing her toys and letting her sit on his head Bob took the puppies to his nursing home and, even at 4 months of age, Daisy immediately went to patients in wheelchairs and figured out how to navigate difficult hospital beds. Daisy was registered with Alliance of Therapy Dogs at 1.5 years of age and passed the Baylor

test shortly after. Daisy did it all - nursing home visits, residential centers for foster care and post-foster care youth, hospital visits, reading programs in both schools and libraries, true Animal Assisted Therapy with special needs children, counseling sessions with abused or neglected children at the Dallas Child Advocacy Center, crisis response visits for the Dallas Police Department, countless college stress relief visits, numerous children's Christmas events, and pretty much every sort of special event that can be imagined. She even attended our church services before she made her Sunday nursing home visits. In total, Daisy was a registered therapy dog for over 11 years and made well over 1,000 visits as a therapy dog. She had a life well-live and left us with little notice, victim of a very fast-growing lung cancer.

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








