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A Word from Our President



←oals! Goals! Goals!

Every year, at my work, they required us to set goals. I'll be honest, I absolutely hated setting goals – they seem so abstract, they could change if some part of the business changed. Setting goals seemed like a waste of time.

Finally one year, the company changed their HR system and finally goals made sense to me. They aren't absolute. They can change with the changing business, and most importantly this new system had us come up with 2-5 bullet points under each goal. These bullet points

Building Maintenance

Responsible for repairs and maintenance on building and grounds. Keeps abreast of the cleaning schedule, lawn service, HVAC maintenance, etc.

Building Rental

Contact person for other organizations (breed/ specialty clubs etc) who are interested in renting the Club building. Works with these groups on the contract and insurance for renting the building.

Bylaws

Responsible for the Constitution and Bylaws interpretation and any revisions or additions the club votes to do.

<u>CGC</u>

Schedules, finds volunteers, and attends the CGC, CGCA, CGCU and Trick Dog tests.

Commissary

Inventory and stock supplies as needed for refrigerator, kitchen and bathroom.

Database/Roster

Updates the master database with new members, attendance, dues. Creates roster for website. Supplies files and analytics as requested. Must also sit on the technology committee.

<u>Historian</u>

Collects articles, letters, photographs and newspaper clippings for inclusion in the Club scrapbook and website.

Legislative Liaison

Determine if there are new state legislation or local ordinances being changed or initiated. Review animal magazines and websites for any news items on animal legislation.

<u>Library</u>

Maintain Club library of books and DVDs. Reviews and recommends books and/or DVDs/CDs for library acquisition.

Created all DTCDC advertising and promotional material to conform to current club logo and other current forms. Work with members to insure a consistent and identifiable presentation. Place advertisements in appropriate paces. Present DTCDC event information to the media. Continue to sponsor the regular obenience First Place Novice A at all Texas Kennel Club Obedience trials.

Purchasing

Purchases Club apparel, training equipment and supplies as they pertain to training.

Registration/Registrar

Responsible for reviewing the students and their dogs for each puppy and beginner class. Get and review all shot records. Make sure students have watched the registration video. Answer questions emailed to the club regarding classes. Manage Eventbrite. Must also sit on the technology committee.

Safety and Awareness

Review news, articles and science on COVID to help the board make intelligent decisions navigating COVID restrictions. Write a report for anyone that has had an accident at the club.

<u>Show 'n Go</u>

Responsible for scheduling SNG dates, volunteers to do run throughs, and stewards. Create and distribute announcement flyers. Oversee the day of SNG. Knowledge of Google Sheets is a plus.

<u>Social</u>

Plan and coordinate social gatherings for the club including a Summer Fun Day and December/Holiday Awards Celebration Banquet.

Social Media

Maintain a professional and business-like presence to promote DTCDC on current social media platforms. Knowledge of FaceBook, Twitter, Instagram, etc. required. Required to sit on the technology committee.

Sunshine

Sends appropriate cards and/or plants to members for illness, sympathy, celebration etc. Coordinate birthday gift "chances" at monthly meetings.

Technology

Manage and maintain the club's computer, Wi-Fi, VoIP, online registration, database, stereo/PA/projector & camera surveillance system. Responsible for setting up Zoom meetings for the board, general membership and committees.

Telephone

Return calls to prospective students, direct people to the website, and informs them how to register. Answers training questions asked by the public.

Therapy

Serves as a resource for club members to obtain information about the various types of therapy dog work and the various therapy dog organizations.

<u>Training</u>

Formulates training policies, fees, and enrollment requirements. Schedules classes, instructors and assistants. Develop and maintain class training procedures and manuals.

Treasury Review

Audits treasurers work when needed. Must have financial background.

<u>Wall</u>

Responsible for maintaining the interior walls of the club in a manner that positively reflects the accomplishments of the club and its members. Includes engraved wall plates as ordered by club members and assembly with supplied photo.

Website

Maintain the Club website and internal membership email list. Required to sit on the technology committee.

No Extension of Dues Deadline this Year

The Board agreed NOT to extend the dues deadline this year. Dues are due January 1, 2022. "A membership will be considered lapsed and automatically terminated if such member's dues remain unpaid after January 31st of each Club year - DTCDC By-Laws Article II, Section 4, B."

It is suggested that to meet the January 31 drop dead date, a member using USPS mail should get the payment in the mail no later than January 15th (January 17th is Martin Luther King day - no mail moves). We all know the post office is slowing down their mail delivery.

Getting dues in on time allows the board to move forward with other items, allows club to know our quorum for the year, etc.

From the start, Sophie had a mind of her own. When my husband, Greg and I went to see a black brindle and white,12week-old Whippet puppy named Sophie, Doug Broadfoot, the breeder, showed us to the kennels (a lavish room just off the kitchen) where four wiggly Whippet pups were jumping at the gate to be let out. I positioned myself right in front to intercept the herd, my husband Greg was standing by the back door talking to Doug's wife Ruth. As soon as the gate was opened, Sophie ran right past me and my open arms to tumble onto Greg's tennis shoes, chewing delightfully at his shoelaces. There she stayed!

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Once home, she showed she would not

be contained, as she quickly climbed a 42" tall ex-pen so she could go exploring the house on her own. I had to make a top for the ex-pen to keep her in place. She would occasionally 'test' my handiwork on that ex-pen top by climbing up and pushing on the weak spots. Eventually I gave up on the ex-pen altogether and used an umbilical leash when she wasn't crated. Luckily, she ADORED her crate!

We quickly began calling her Nuffie as in "That's enough!"

She also liked to sleep in the dryer. Whenever the dryer would buzz, she would trot to the laundry room and wait until I lowered the dryer door so she could hop in and snuggle down onto the hot clothes as I folded them. Many times, I would just leave her in the dryer with the door down as she snoozed. Maybe she thought the dryer was her second crate.

Sophie was also a 'kneeler'. (*Right*) She would 'kneel' on her front legs. She would be in a sitting position, but her front 'wrists' would be on the ground rather like a goat. It looked very uncomfortable, but she didn't seem to mind it at all. She would kneel on a hard, cold tile floor or a soft doggie bed. Didn't matter. She would never do it on command nor stay in that position very long. I've since learned from other dog owners that this seems to be an inherited trait. Regardless, I always found it endearing.

She was also a natural water sprite! Whippets are not supposed to get near water as they will melt when expose to it (according to Whippets). Not Sophie. Sophie quickly learned to deal with Teague's rough puppy play by ignoring him. But soon they were good buds. Sophie easily earned her C.G.C., C.G.C.A, C.G.C.U. late in life

intense pain and after several false diagnoses, going to several vets, including being involved in a fire at the Veterinary Specialist of North Texas in Ft. Worth, the cause was found- lumbosacral syndrome. With meds, limited to short, harnessed walks and strict crate rest, she slowly got better.

On July 9, 2021, Sophie began acting 'off'. Tests showed maybe pancreatitis. Low fat diets and meds did nothing. Could be a flare up with her back again but something else was not right. An ultrasound showed the problem- a large tumor on her spleen. I knew what that meant - Hemangiosarcoma. All other tests showed promise of containment, so a splenectomy was performed on August 11. The tumor ruptured during surgery making her prognosis grave.

I let her out of her crate early morning September 30. She gave a soft cough. I helped her outside to potty. She tried to make it back into the house but collapsed by the backdoor. I stayed with her, petting her, and talking to the emergency vets as my vet wasn't opened yet. Teague sat in the middle of the backyard, watching. Greg came home from work in time to see her rally and walk to her beloved cuddle bed. She was so pale. I knew what was happening. I offered her some rotisserie chicken and she gobbled it down. She never lost her appetite. She stayed quiet until the 9:30 a.m. appointment with the vet. She collapsed again in the back seat of the truck. I held her in my lap, wrapped in her favorite soft grey blankie as I tearfully said goodbye, telling her what a brave girl she was.



Go Ahead, Call Your Dog Your "Fur Baby"

Cognitive scientists can point to many, many similarities between canines and human offspring.

When our daughter was born, we found ourselves using the words *puppy* and *baby* interchangeably.

My husband and I both grew up in households with dogs, and now have a 35-pound black dog with a white chest named Scout. We'd say things like "Oh, the puppy is hungry," meaning our infant, or "The baby needs a walk," referring to the dog. We'd often call the dog "our toddler." Of course, it caused confusion sometimes because we'd have to clarify whether we mean the *human* baby or the four-footed one.

I'd occasionally refer to the pediatrician's office as the veterinary office by accident. I'd joke that our approach to our daughter's health was like our dog's—is her energy good, is her nose cold, and does she have a happy disposition? OK, then she's fine. Ultimately, I think we both hoped that we'd instill a love of dogs into our daughter.

But as our baby—the Homo sa*piens* one – got older and more aware of the world, I notice some surprising similarities between her and our furry pup. Both of them possessed a tendency toward devious problem-solving, whether it was the dog climbing on a chair to access the garbage can more effectively or the baby figuring out how to escape from her playpen. Perhaps our mix-up of language was not just an affectation but rooted in something firmer. After all, I'm not the only one who refers to their pet as their "fur child" or puts <u>animal ears</u> on a toddler. In fact, recent research suggests that in terms of cognition, dogs and children

have a lot in common.

For starters, neither dogs nor small children can talk (at least not in full sentences). But you can explain things to them and ask them to do things as well, as Daphna Buchsbaum, director of both the <u>Computational Cognitive Development Lab and the Canine</u> <u>Cognition Lab at Brown University</u>, notes. Dogs also show attachment to their owners, as babies do with their parents, Buchsbaum explains; both expect social engagement from the caregiver, and both respond to eye contact.

Dogs can be surprisingly good judges of character. Buchsbaum was an author on a <u>February study</u> that explored how dogs were able to differentiate between humans who provide them with accurate data versus those who do not. In the study, a person (an "informant"), would point to a cup where a treat might be located. The incorrect informant would point to a cup without the treat, while the accurate informant would point to the true treat. The question was whether dogs could learn which informant would consistently share the treat location. The work "found that dogs are in that case able to follow the more accurate person" and that children, too, have the "sophisticated ability to understand essentially who is a good person to learn from," Buchsbaum said.

Dogs also have a basic understanding of object specifics, Buchsbaum said, which means understanding object permanence and solidity (i.e., objects cannot pass through one another). As for children, "depending on what measures you use, even very young infants (possibly newborns) have some expectations about how objects should behave, though this continues to develop in toddlerhood and beyond," she explained. From about 12 to 18 months old, children "spend a lot of time experimenting with and learning about object properties (think about how much they love to throw things!)," Buchsbaum told me via email.

Canines don't have opposable thumbs, but the way they learn about other things is similar to the way that young humans learn. Brian Hare, <u>professor of</u> <u>cognitive neuroscience at Duke University</u>, noted in an email interview that dogs can learn words through fast mapping, like children. "So rather than being taught every single word, these dogs learn by a process of exclusion," he explained. For instance, say there's a red ball and a toy car on a table, and your child knows the word *ball* but not *car*. If you ask them to get the car, they'll grab the object on the table that is not a ball.

Some dogs show a remarkable ability to understand language. The border collie Chaser was renowned for knowing more than 1,000 words, according to NPR, which is about the average number of words a 3-yearold child knows. And researchers at the University of California–San Diego are studying dogs that <u>seem</u> to be able to communicate concepts with the use of buttons that say words aloud, like "more, scritches, now." Of course, dogs do not have full language skills like an understanding of grammar, Buchsbaum cautioned.

But it's not all about cognition. As much as some people might cringe when a kidless person refers to their dog as their "child," our love for our dogs is comparable to our love for our children in some senses. Evan MacLean, <u>director of Arizona Canine</u> <u>Cognition Center</u>, noted that domestication may have selected for "juvenile characteristics of wolves." Wolf puppies tend to have relatively big eyes, short snouts, floppy ears—familiar attributes found in many young and adult breeds of dogs—that adult wolves don't have. These traits make them appear forever immature. "Dogs are like Peter Pan," MacLean said. "They get older, but they never grow up," and they're kind of "playing a trick on our brain" to see them as babies that need to be taken care of. A 2014 study published in <u>PLOS One</u>, for which researchers at Massachusetts General Hospital took brain scans of women looking at pictures of their children and dogs, found that both instances triggers similar emotional and brain responses.

If you're a parent (of any kind!) you may have felt the happy high that comes with staring at those big eyes and snuggly little body. "Parents and their new babies have a physiological mechanism called the oxytocin loop to help them bond when babies are not very verbal and extremely labor-intensive," Hare said, "Researchers have found that dogs can insert themselves into this oxytocin loop so that when a dog stares at their owner, and vice versa, the oxytocin in it creates a similar kind of oxytocin loop as parents have with their new babies."

The inherent similarities between dogs and children can even point to new research avenues. Buschbaum is planning on studying "joint attention" in dogs. It's considered an important part of toddler development, when a child will want to engage a second person around an object like a toy. For any dog owner, that behavior may sound really familiar—you're playing fetch, and your pup returns a ball to someone else to get them in on the fun. Ultimately, these studies help us better understand how cognition and intelligence work in general.

But of course, it's important to remember that there are critical differences between dogs and humans. Buchsbaum pointed out that as humans, we undervalue how dogs might see the world differently from us. We see the world primarily through vision, like our primate relatives, but dogs rely more on scent.

Someday my child will hopefully learn how to speak 20,000–35,000 words, compose essays, care for herself, and cook her own dinner. Our dog, on the other hand, will always rely on us for the rest of her life. In that sense, she's even more infantile than an infant—she'll always be our baby.



Need a new trick to teach your dog?

This trick is a variation of "sit pretty" for you to try! Have fun!

Train Your Dog To Put His "Hands Up" (or High Ten!)



Hands up is a fantastic trick that looks great. The dog is taught to sit back and hold both front paws up simultaneously. Easy to reinforce by offering the word "hands up" and a treat each time the dog manages to get both front paws off the ground. The pure position of this trick makes it look like it was really difficult to teach but if you reward with good timing early on then the dog will perfect his position with little effort from you.

1. Begin with your dog in the sit position and stand in front of him holding a treat.

2. The idea is to encourage your dog to stay in a sit position yet offer a quick lure with the treat from his nose upwards until his front paws leave the ground, then reward.

3. If the dog gets up from the sit position in an attempt to take the treat ask him to sit again and make the lure less prominent.

4. Repeat the previous two stages until the dog stays in a sit position and is able to lift both his front paws off the ground.

5. Reward each time his paws leave the ground then when he is confident to do this slightly withhold the reward until he begins to try harder by lifting both feet higher off the ground each time he does this reward his finest attempt with a treat. Add your command word.

Top Tip Timing must be perfect when teaching tricks so pinpoint exactly what you would like your dog to do more of until his position is exactly what you would like.

Dog trainers love this trick because it teaches the dog focus and to concentrate on gaining a reward by getting into an unnatural position.
