Alas, not to worry, it has been postponed/rescheduled to June. This grand event has been held in New York City for 144 years. It is second only to the Kentucky Derby for being a continuously held sporting event in the U.S. The Derby, always the first Saturday of May, was held in September last year. With crowds of 150,000+, the 2020 races allowed less than 23,000 to be in attendance.

The 145<sup>th</sup> Westminster Dog Show will be held at Lyndhurst in Tarrytown, New York, outdoors, on June 12-13. Lyndhurst is a 67 acre estate with a mansion/castle designed in 1838 that was donated to the National Trust for Historic Preservation in 1961. The property has previously been used for dog shows and has been the site of several movies and TV shows. You probably remember the Dark Shadows movies and the exterior was used in All My Children (how many of you will admit that you watched a soap opera or two???)

The first Westminster dog show was held at Gilmore's Garden near Madison Square in Manhattan. This eventually became Madison Square Garden I. This building was originally built by P.T. Barnum for his circus and was an outdoor venue with a canvas canopy to be raised in case of wet weather. Over the years, there have been four Madison Square Garden buildings, all of which have hosted Westminster.


Westminster 2021 will be interesting to watch, especially in an outdoor setting. Let's all hope the weather cooperates.

Last year halted many of you from earning titles, but we know some of you are now going to trials and shows and showing again. In response to that the committee wants to offer you the opportunity to get your dog's accomplishments recognized on the wall once again.



If your dog has earned a new title that hasn't been acknowledged,

please use the wall form located in the Members section of the club's website, fill it out and send it to me. We will see that the name plates are ordered. If you have problems locating the form, please contact me and I will send it to you.

Once we receive them I will be able to hang them on your dog's wall photo by coming in when a class is being held or on my own with prior club permission.

If your dog has a title and you haven't submitted a photo to get him/her recognized on the wall please read the information below to get started. It has come to my attention some info is out of date and some sports new since 1998 not listed so here is main points:

#### **QUALIFICATIONS FOR POSTING A PICTURE**

Approved by DTCDC Membership on November 3, 1998

- 1. A picture of a DTCDC club member's dog(s) may be posted (living or deceased) that earns titles and has trained through the DTCDC.
- 2. A picture may be posted for any dog that earns a traditional title or passes a test such as CGC or Therapy Dog; titles earned at tracking, lure coursing, Fast CAT, herding, hunting, or other field/ working trials, barn hunt, flyball, ability or nosework competitions may also be posted. Breed champion titles may also be posted.

#### PROCEDURE


- 1. Pictures need to be 5"X7", with the member furnishing the photo for normal titles. For pictures of dogs with full championship titles, please contact Jan Hitchborn.
- 2. The title plates must hang on the bottom of the picture and will include the call name or registered name of the dog, the title, date title was obtained, and any other honors the dog may be entitled to. The dog's owner (and/or handler's) name must be engraved on the first plate to be hung. (The club pays for this plate.)
- 3. The club will supply the frame and the member supplies the picture and pays for the engraving of the plate(s).
- 4. When a title is earned, it is the owner's responsibility to make the necessary arrangements to obtain the proper title plate.



# Find my keys

This isn't just a cool dog trick; it's potentially a game-changer. How many times have you lost your keys and wished you had a magic key-finding buddy at your service? Well, here's your chance to create that buddy.

Before you get started, make sure that your keys are easy for your dog to pick up. Attach something soft to the key ring, maybe a small soft toy or a handkerchief.

• First of all, just sit with your dog and play a basic retrieve game with your keys. Just rattle them yourself, put them down and rattle them on the floor and praise your dog as she takes an interest in picking them up. When she does, say 'keys' and offer lots of praise, take them from her with a drop/out gue and play again. The aim is f



take them from her with a drop/out cue and play again. The aim is for your dog to be comfortable picking up the keys and dropping them in your hands when you ask.

- If you gradually increase the distance between you and the keys, your dog will start to get used to picking them up and bringing them to you.
- Make this an exciting, high energy and well-rewarded game so when your dog drops the keys in your hands, they're paid well.
- As you've been playing, your dog will have started to pair the word 'keys' with the item they're carrying, so we can now add the element of 'find it' to the game.
- Leave the keys with a couple of other items and ask your dog to 'find the keys' which will show you whether she has understood the cue of 'keys'.

As you practice this in different places around the house, remembering to make it fun and keep it well paid to help your dog respond quickly and understanding what is being asked of her.

Now you can discreetly hide your keys, wait a little while and then ask your dog to 'find the keys'. If she doesn't find them straight away or finds an alternative to keys, don't worry, just ask again. If it's quickly obvious that she's not sure what you've asked her to do, just go back a step and practice that a bit more.

When your dog can easily find your keys from anywhere in the house, it's time to up your game. Head out into your garden, or try this on walks. Start by 'accidentally' dropping your keys and encouraging your dog to pick them up for you. Do this a few times and then 'accidentally' drop your keys, say nothing, and see how your dog responds. Give lots of praise and a decent treat for a positive choice and if your dog decides you can pick up your own keys, that's ok too! You can try again when there's less distraction and after some more practice of asking first.

One thing to remember... if you have a tendency to leave your keys lying around, your dog will learn that bringing them to you is rewarded. 


