The objectives of the Club shall be:

Article I, Section 2 of the Dog Training Club of Dallas County, Inc. Constitution and Bylaws As Amended as of November 10, 2020

COVID Protocols as of February 27, 2022

- 1. Masks are optional.
- 2. Social distancing required.
- 3. Sign up lists, located on the clip board inside the door, are required but COVID disclosure sheets are not.
- 4. No more than 20 people in the building for classes.
- 5. The Show N Go can only have 15 people in the building at one time since most are seated behind the gates.
- If you do not feel well, have a headache, have sniffles, a cough etc. do not come to the club until they subside and/or you get a negative PCR COVID test.



Regardless of what protocol level

I have COVID - now what do I do:

- 1. Have you been at the club in the last 7 days? If yes, then please, as soon as you know you are positive, call David Elliott, training director (214-563-6734), or Margaret Culbertson, president (214-926-4273). Let them know that you have COVID and when you were at the club which classes you are in, maybe you were at the Show n Go, or just training by yourself what day and time. This is both for members and non-members.
- 2. You will be asked to stay out of the club building for 2 weeks from date of positive test to keep things easy this means two weeks of classes.
- 3. We request that you call people that you have been in direct contact with, so they are aware.
- 4. Your spouse or any other person living in your house cannot take your spot in a class. Members of your household are asked to quarantine away from the club for the time period.
- 5. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated. Your health is your private matter and your name will be kept confidential only known by your instructors, David and Margaret.

What will the club do:

- 1. David or Margaret will contact the instructor. The instructor will be told which student and the date of his/her return. The instructor will keep the name(s) of the infected individual(s) confidential.
- 2. David, Margaret, or if asked the instructor will call, email and/or text every person in the class of the infected person and inform the class that there was a person in class on a specific date that has come down with COVID. A previous class or class after might be contacted. If a Show n Go, then depending on your times in the building, it will depend on who will be contacted. The infected person's name will remain confidential.
- 3. David or Margaret will be in telephone contact with the infected person as needed. The instructor nor anyone else will not be contacting the infected person on behalf of the club.

Did You Know? - Resources for Instructors & Assistants

<u>Some forms currently used by the club</u> (information obtained from the www.dallasdogtraining.org website (mostly in the Member's Only Section) and forms located in the white cabinet in the closet):

<u>Promotional Code for Eventbrite Registration for Classes Only</u> (Members Only) can be accessed under the Member's Only Section of the website under the heading "Class Registration Forms". Do not use this code for the Show-N-Go, CGCs, Tricks Test, etc.

<u>Annual Class Registration Form</u> (also found on the website, in the binder for Annual Forms on top of the white cabinet by the front door, and in the white cabinet in the closet if no blank forms in binder). This form is used by all members bringing a dog to a class. One form for each dog. Place in the binder in alphabetical order by last name of the handler. Each handler should sign the form. Instructors should check to make sure each club member in their class has filled out the form. This can be a duty assigned to an assistant.

Class Registration Form (found on the website & in the white cabinet in the closet): This has been replaced by the questions asked on Eventbrite when a student registers for a class. This form might still be used by an administrator for someone without internet access.

Instructor Resources & Forms Used in Class:

Class Rosters: The person running the Eventbrite site/application for the club will generate your class roster on a spreadsheet and email it to the instructor.

On the website there are two versions in Excel and 2 versions in .pdf if you want to write up your own. There are also paper versions in the closet if you like to hand write to keep track of your student attendance.

Keep Track of Attendance: Instructors/Assistants should check off the classes each week to keep track of student participation.

Name Tags: There are boxes of name tag holders and name tags in the white cabinet in the closet. It is helpful to make up tags with the handler's first name and dog's first name. Distribute them at the beginning of each class and collect them back at the end of each class. It helps everyone learn the participants names.

DTCDC COVID Sign Up Sheet: EVERYONE must sign in. This form is on the table by the front door. Every time anyone goes in the building they should sign in and sign out. Don't congregate around the table.

DTCDC Student Evaluation Form: These forms are located in the white cabinet in the closet. <u>Use them for all classes with PAYING STUDENTS.</u> At the last class, set up a clip board & pen for each PAYING student to use to fill this form out. Members are also welcome to contribute feedback with the form. Collect the form at the end of the last class. After reviewing them, please place them in the Training Director's bin in the kitchen (on the wall).

Certificate of Completion Forms: These are located in the white cabinet in the closet. These are distributed by the Instructor at the last Beginner and last Puppy class. These can be printed on your computer if you know how to line it up. Do a test run and hold the mock-up behind the certificate to check placements of names.

Toys: There are also boxes of toys for use at the last class of Beginner & Puppy classes.

Incident Report Form: Use this form for any type of injury to a person in class. (Fall, dog bite, etc.)

Instructor and Assistant Manual is linked in the Member's Only Section.

On the Classes page: Fido's Extra Reading Material has 5 sections & approximately 59 articles.

Library Cabinet:

Members may check out books & videos. Follow the instructions on the top of the card file boxes located in the unlocked brown cabinet near the maintenance closet/kitchen area.


Jan Bajovich shares how she displays Kelly's ribbons and certificates:

My little overachiever needed a space to brag on his multiple accomplishments in various sports: Obedience. Rally, Nosework, Trick Dog, Barn Hunt and certificates for AKC Canine Good Citizen, Farm Dog, UKC SPOT, and ATTS Temperament Test. His accomplishments were so numerous, only the rosettes fit on the wall. It required not only one, but two 3" binders to hold all his certificates and flat ribbons. Now, as I watch him develop so many of the symptoms of age that we share with our canine friends, the memories of years of training and trialing are bittersweet. How I miss working with him! So, however you display your pups accolades, I hope you take time to feel proud of yourself as well. It takes a team to win.





Dog Zoomies Explained: 6 Reasons Your Dog Goes Bonkers Sometimes

Dog zoomies are silly antics canines do when they have frantic energy. Learn what causes the sudden spunkiness and when you're most likely to catch it on video.

Dog zoomies are a natural canine phenomenon. It's when dogs, for seemingly no reason at all, suddenly burst into movement—racing around, spinning in circles, bouncing up and down, or parkouring over the couch. Although there appears to be no cause, those sudden bursts of energy may actually serve a purpose, experts say.

What Causes Dog Zoomies?

The technical name for dog zoomies is frenetic random activity periods (FRAPs), according to the American Kennel Club. And they're just another weird canine behavior, like reverse sneezing, that serves a purpose: to release pent-up energy. "Generally speaking, dog zoomies happen when dogs are feeling happy and excited," says Amelia Wieber, dog behavior consultant, trainer, and Daily Paws Advisory Board member. It's just good fun for your pup (until a kid or a vase gets knocked over).

But too many zoomies may signal that your dog needs more physical activity or mental stimulation. "Zoomies can happen regardless of how much you exercise your dog," says Wieber. "But if your dog is having more and more zoomies and it feels like it's becoming unmanageable, your pooch may need more exercise."

6 Common Reasons Why Dogs Get the Zoomies

All dogs, from basset hounds to Great Danes, get the zoomies. Puppies and young dogs may zip around more often simply because they have more energy to burn than older dogs. But pups in their golden years can still get zoomies too.

Dogs frequently get zoomies at certain times. And although we can't know for sure why they do it, here are some likely reasons:

1. Release tension and anxiety

Dogs frequently zoom around after bath time, which is probably a way for them to get rid of anxious energy. "When there's been some event that's happened and it was stressful or exciting, like taking a







bath, zoomies help dogs release that built-up tension," says Lisa Radosta, DVM, a board-certified veterinary behaviorist at Florida Veterinary Behavior Service.

2. Warm up

Dogs who jet around the house after a walk or coming in from the outside may be trying to warm up. This could also be the case for dogs that do mad dashes after getting out of the bath, pool, or lake.

3. Celebrate a feel-good moment

Many pet parents note that their dogs get zoomies after pooping. "It's like they just unloaded something major and it's time for a whacked-out celebration," says Radosta. "But sometimes if dogs have a little bit of poop stuck to them, they may also run around to escape from the poop. That might look like zoomies, too."

4. Act on primal instinct

It's common for zoomies to happen at specific periods during the day, says certified professional dog trainer and Daily Paws Advisory Board member Irith Trietsch Bloom. It may have to do with their built-in biological rhythms. "Dogs tend to have a burst of energy in the morning and in the evening, which probably has to do with hunting cycles," she says. "For example, coyotes hunt at dawn and dusk because that's when prey is waking up and falling asleep and they're more vulnerable."

5. Relieve pain

Almost always, dog zoomies are a positive event. But occasionally, it could be triggered by a sharp but passing pain in the hind area, says Radosta. For example, pain from a flea bite or arthritis that's acting up may spook your pup, who then runs to escape it.

6. Show excitement

Sometimes dogs whiz around when something happens to rev them up, like seeing a special person or another dog. "They just can't contain their excitement," Bloom says.

Dog zoomies are hilarious and entertaining, and Radosta encourages pet parents to make the most of it. "When my own dog gets the zoomies, I act like I'm stalking him," she says. "That makes him a lunatic. He's like a category-five hurricane all over the place and jumping around. So, you can really have a good time with the zoomies."



Teaching Your Dog the Names of Items

Difficulty: Moderate **Prerequisite:** None

Items Needed: Clicker, Treats

Dogs are a lot smarter than we give them credit for and can learn the names of all sorts of things. A border collie named Chaser currently holds the record for the largest dog vocabulary, having learned the names of over 1000 different toys and items. Dog's aren't limited to objects, they can learn



the names of people and other pets as well. Wouldn't it be nice if your dog knew your kids' names? You can teach your dog the names of all his toys, the remote, or a place like his kennel or the living room.

Step 1:	Have your dog touch your hand and click treat.
Step 2:	Hold the object in your hand and say touch. Click treat when he touches the object not when he touches your hand.
Step 3:	Call the object by its name (tug, squeaky, bunny, etc.) just as he touches it. Click and treat.
Step 4:	Repeat 5 times.
Step 5:	Hold the object and say its name and click and treat when he touches it.
Step 6:	For teaching the names of people (Bob, Joe, Dad, Mom, etc.) and places (Bed, corner, kennel, etc.) use the training stick to introduce the person or place.
