

CGC Committee

The CGC committee oversees testing our canine friends for the CGC, CGCA, CGCU and Trick Dog. We usually give the tests following the end of each session. The objective is to test the manners of our dogs and the responsibility of pet owners. A dog with good manners is able to go to public places with confidence. A CGC title must be on file with the club for dogs to participate in public events the club participates in. All requirements for the tests are provided in class and at AKC.org.

Commisary Committee

Commissary Committee is currently one person who watches and replenishes the supplies at the club. The supplies are drinks, water, cheese, toilet paper, paper towels. and trash bags. The commissary person stocks the refrigerator when he/she is there, but everyone should help out if we are low on something. Extras can be found on the shelving by the bathroom. Our supplies are usually purchased at Costco to help with expenses. This committee could use another volunteer or two to help.

Database/Roster Committee Needs You

The Database/Roster committee keeps a database of all members, their information, and their dogs. With the database, we can use it to pull members within an area, those that have not paid, birthdays, certain members by date joined, etc. We try to keep general membership attendance entered in the system as well. The Database is a relational database in MS Access. There are 9 tables linked by either Individual IDs and/or Household IDs. Three or four times a year a roster is pulled and saved to the members only website for all members to use. Anyone knowledgeable with MS Access is urged to contact me. We need to figure out how to safely share this on Dropbox or some other way so that we can have multiple people able to work on it from their home/office.



A Note from Your Training Director



Session One is in the history books. Thank you to all the instructors and assistants that made that possible. You had to deal with new

personnel, and an ice storm that arrived a week early and refused to leave. Yet you handled it brilliantly.

When session one started, it seemed like one thing done wrong and the whole system would fail. Things DID go wrong but the club is STILL standing prepared to begin more classes.

Session two is about to begin and Session three is already in the planning stages. This training year is moving forward and it is going to be a great year.



Approach to Training

How many times do we approach a training session with a sense of dread because we are afraid of making a mistake, hold on to a training method just because we have time invested and see a change in course as a waste, or letting the fear of failure prevent us from starting to train or trying something new?

Remember, you always get a "do over" in training. You can stop and start again, stop at any point in an exercise if you don't like the results and try a new approach rather than continuing to practice the exercise wrong. You can also reward what went right at any point in the process. The way your dog responds or performs an exercise is determined by the information/training initially provided and the feedback throughout the training process. If your dog is making mistakes, he/she is giving you feed back that you can use to adjust your training. When you begin an exercise are you looking toward the end with your dog? Or are you looking at your dog and they are looking at something else? Yes, this is an analogy from utility go outs, you have to look where you want the dog to go, yet it fits the rest of training. You have to get and keep your dog on the same page with you. Communicate your expectations with your dog. Incorporate playtime to build drive and enjoyment of the work you are asking them to perform. Work with how your dog behaves and modify your training to bring out the best they have to offer. Let your dog know that they are more valuable to you because of what you have gone through as a team.

Don't let a day go by without doing something to engage your teammate's mind. No matter how tired you may be, the look in their eyes will be worth the effort.



Legislative Liaison Committee Update

Possible Texas State Legislation Alert



The president of a
Texas-based breed
club received a call
from AKC's Legislative
Analyst/Community
Outreach Coordinator
asking for help to get
the below message
distributed, and asked that
anyone in Bell, Bandera,

Gillespie, Kerr, Llano, Lampasas, Sutton, Kimble, Medina, Burnet and Coryell Counties, contact Senator Pete Flores about this proposed legislation.

This bill will impact those who that own females and co-owned females regardless of whether they're too young or too old for breeding, not meant to be bred, or will potentially be bred by another owner.

Senate Bill 876 will require anyone that owns 5 intact female dogs to become a commercially licensed dog breeder even if they never breed a litter or sell a single dog.

It will also lower the commercial breeder licensing threshold in Texas to 5 intact females and it will remove the requirement that a breeder must sell 20 dogs before a license is required. Currently, a dog breeder in Texas is required to become commercially licensed if they own 11 or more intact females and sell 20 or more dogs in a license year.

Texas State Senator Pete Flores is a sponsor of this legislation and it is essential that he hears from constituents that are concerned with this bill.

It is recommended that breeders contact State Senator Pete Flores as soon as possible and let him know you are a constituent that opposes SB 876 and urge him to consider withholding the bill from consideration. Be sure to share your experience and expertise with dogs and express how this legislation will negatively impact your hobby and way of life.

Summary:

Changing the licensing thresholds will force hobby breeders to:

- Open their private homes or facilities to third party inspectors following an application and at least once every 18 months thereafter
- Submit to a criminal background check when applying for licensure
- Submit a yearly report in addition to the yearly application for licensure accounting for all animals held at a breeder's facility
- Pay a \$250 permit fee for every license year
- Meet one size fits all housing standards for the dogs in their care
- It is also important to note that in June 2020, staff of the Texas Sunset Advisory Commission recommended that the Dog and Cat Breeder Act should be eliminated due to fundamental flaws with the law that created it, the program's ineffectiveness, and significant operational costs.

The AKC's staff findings indicated that the Dog and Cat Breeders Act is fundamentally flawed because it provides significant statutory exemptions and unenforceable requirements that undermine both the program's goals and Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation efforts. Moreover, the program revenues have been found to fall far short of funding the administration of the licensed breeder program; yet despite these disproportionately high administrative costs, the Commission found that Texans still primarily rely on other laws that predate the program.



Outstanding - They have had outstanding success on college stress relief visits. These older kids need just as much help as their younger counterparts.

Responsible - They have shown what a responsible team they are by working with suicide prevention programs. Therapy work has expanded to new venues and this team has followed.

Incredible - Hospital visits are a venue where this team does incredible work. Bringing a therapy dog into a hospital room can really brighten up the spirit of the patient.

Dock Diving Dobermans

By Pam White

Come of the Dobermans in our club have participated and Denjoy the sport of dock jumping. The dog runs down a 40' dock in pursuit of a bumper thrown by their handler, launches into the air and lands in the swimming pool. The length of their jump distance is measured. The dog then retrieves (although not mandatory) it's bumper and returns to the handler with the prize. There are no minimum distances - all jumps off the dock are judged. All breeds and sizes of dogs participate and enjoy the water fun. There are other disciplines such as "air retrieve" where the bumper is suspended above the water and the dog must jump and grab the bumper. There is also "hydro dash" which is a timed swimming to the length of the pool to retrieve a suspended bumper. This Sport, like many others, are enhanced by an obedience trained dog. Some handlers sit their dog at the end of the dock until they are released. Then the dog performs a retrieve back to the handler. And must release this bumper. Then it is extremely helpful if you can heel your dog back down to the end of the dock to set up. That 40' seems extremely long when you are physically pulling a non compliant dog to the end.

She had never competed in a dog sport before and had a blast. In this sport, the dog is the one who has the most physical part as he/she does the running, jumping and swimming.

What Kadee learned is that not only do we throw the bumper, we are the cheerleaders and crew for our canine athlete. We are a team of three on the dock. One dog, one handler who restrains the dog and one who throws the bumper. Not everyone has a second handler, but it was important to us because restraining our dog along with shouts of "Ready, Ready" brings forth a burst of excitement that sends our dog racing to the end of the dock to jump as far as she or he can after the bumper. We didn't win the big prize at Nationals, ending up 8th with Tris and 10th

with Finn at the finals, but that wasn't why we went. It was the excitement, the big lights, the experience of stepping onto that dock with your dog, ready to give it your all. Both Finn and Tris gave Kadee the most wonderful life lessons. It was was a great way to learn about sportsmanship and to still have fun despite things not going your way. The photos say all. The excitement of releasing Finn and see him take off with great speed, walking on the dock, seeing Tris take that jump, and the laughter when Finn said he had enough of that cold water!







If your dogs like water, we recommend trying out this sport. You will get more out of it then you expect.







Journey of a Lifetime

et me start with saying that training to compete in any dog sport in 2015 was not on my retired bucket list and, in fact, had never even been floating on my horizon. My husband and I had been very active with DFW Metro Golden Retriever Rescue for years. We always trained our dog with a DTCDC member whom many of the long time members know. This DTCDC member had her own canine training business and we got her contact information way back in 1986. My husband trained our Golden puppy in her newbie training club. As we got involved in rescue, we trained all the pups we adopted with her and earned CGCs on them. I reached out to her in 2014 about training with our mini-Aussie, Skye, and learned that she had finally retired from training and told me to go to the Duncanville club she oftentimes mentioned over the years. I did and enrolled Skye in a January 2015 beginner obedience class and had a great time. That was to be a onetime

deal, but my husband, who was terminally ill and in hospice care, sat me down

and told me to continue on as I would need a whole new group of friends and events that did not and had never included him to move on. I took the advice to heart and did similar classes with Logan and Maggie, and with all three continued into intermediate obedience, CGCs, CGCAs. CGCUs, and novice and advance titles in AKCs new Trick Dog program.

I look back and think I was crazy to train all three at same time with so many different events. I joined the club in May of 2015 and had been hearing about a sport that was getting traction - Nosework. When a second introduction class was announced I jumped into it with Logan and we were both totally and completely hooked! We enjoyed that summer class taught by Victor Borras, Bob Rodriguez, Danika and Holly Taylor. About three classes in, my

husband passed away a little sooner than we had thought. So, I continued with the class, assisted in a Beginner obedience class, took the Intermediate classes hoping Nosework would get a timeslot soon. I joined a Nosework training class south of Fort Worth in January 2016 that one of my fellow Nosework classmates, Jan Bajovich, told me about and we traveled together one evening a week. I told Benita about the class and she joined in as well. January of 2016 also saw the start of Nosework classes at DTCDC. Logan and I started trialing in Nosework in March of 2016 along with Vicki Jackson, Jan B. and Benita Zapata. It was at that first trial I met another Dallas area woman very involved in Nosework. I reached out to her after that trial and she mentioned a group she started at another woman's facility and Benita and I as well as Horst Bungarz with his GS Kaiser continued with it. Benita and I hooked up with the lady and we three learned the ins and outs of Nosework by trial and error! Along the way we got to know Robin Vogel who was taking a week night Nosework class. Georgann had been in that summer intro class and was continuing in the DTCDC Nosework class-

es. Many of us have continued with the woman I met at the first trial as she is now a judge in many of the Nosework disciplines and we picked her brain for all the tips we could get.

Through Nosework, I was introduced to competition and traveling to different locations to train and eventually compete. Logan and I have met so many wonderful folks over the years. I look back and laugh at our mistakes and smile big with every success. At first the end of the tunnel was an EN - Elite Nosework title (at the time we started, the sport was growing as a UKC sport and had been around a while with NACSW but AKC had not jumped on the bandwagon yet). Six months after Logan earned his EN, we learned rules were to change to start level championships for a full championship and a grand championship. In the last few months of that year we would have the opportunity to grandfather in at either the Master Champion level or Elite Championship/Nosework Championship. It was quite a challenge which most of us took on and Logan did get grandfathered in as a Master Nosework Champion. Now the rules were that he had to earned three qualifying runs in all elite elements to earn the Elite Championship/Nosework Championship. We started with great enthusiasm, but March of 2020 arrived







bringing the Covid shut down with it. We improvised and had seven months of home training with Robin and Benita joining us as they could at my place outside with social distancing a must. It was at this time Skye had started competing in Nosework and since we were at home, I started having her work the searches I set up for Logan. We got back to classes and trialing in masks the Fall of 2020 and in May of 2021 Logan earned the Elite Championship and Champion Nosework titles. Logan loves this sport so much. Anyone who has watched him do a search no matter how large or small will see that tail is going all the time. I decided there was no way I would retire him. He had already demonstrated he would do rally trialing but was really just to be with me not for love of sport. So we set our sights on going for a Nosework Grand Championship with the required five qualifying runs in all five levels, novice, advance, superior, master, elite and every level had containers, interiors, exteriors and vehicles. Logan was getting older, as was I, so I decided to shoot for the Elite Grand Championship first as all elements in it were now an unknown

number and it required a lot of learning to read Logan's body language to understand when he said he had found them (that whole time taught me so much and now I also can read Skye as she is at that level). Logan finished the Elite Grand Championship May of 2022. Then we had to juggle around the levels Skye was in for finishing her Master Title and then her EN. January saw Logan earning his Master and Superior Grand Championships and Skye her EN. This February Logan finished his Advance and Nosework Grand Championships and his Grand Championship. Many folks we met along the way were in the same trials so we were in friendly competition to finish up. One couple I have gotten to know from Tulsa finished the Grand with each of their mini-Aussies same day as Logan. A great day with great folks. Logan will never retire as long as he is up to the challenge. It's mesmerizing watching my dogs search at a trial and I marvel at this sport the dog controls. I am just there staying out of the way to cheer them on. He's opened up a whole new world for me with great folks. Turns out Skye is as passionate about scent work as he is. Skye is now working on championship legs in many of the levels. We have a new one at home named Oliver Twist who looks to be as passionate about Nosework as my others and may turn out to be an all-around dog. Oliver Twist seems up for anything. Time will tell.

The photos in this article are reminders of our celebrations after successful fun runs through the years. This journey opened up a whole new world, and now my pups and I work hard to share the joy and tips to beginners and those starting the Nosework journey. I look forward to the future watching them succeed and to continue the journey with my crew. Meanwhile I dream with the phrase "Find It!" on my lips and in my mind.




