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A Word from Our President



Why should I volunteer? That's a very important question that has so many answers.

A Note from Your Training Director



“It’s supposed to be hard. If it wasn’t hard, everyone would do it. The hard... is what makes it great.”

~ Jimmy Dugan

Do we give up too soon? Do we set our goals too low? Do we under-estimate what our dogs can achieve? Do we under-estimate what we are capable of teaching our dogs? How many times have trainers said “I just want a green ribbon” and then are disappointed after getting that green ribbon because they know they didn’t really train as hard as possible. Those sits weren’t as quick or as straight as they would have liked. The dog lost focus because not enough practice time with distractions of people or noise. We train without expecting the best from our dogs or ourselves. We allow a crooked sit time after time rather than planning ahead and helping the dog perform a straight sit. We continue to aid the dog with lures, verbal or body cues rather than fading those aids and make the dog take responsibility for their part in the performance. We fail to spend time on the fundamentals until we have them perfected before moving on and then accuse the dog of being obstinate or stubborn. When in reality we haven’t provided clear instructions on what was expected.

Periodically it is wise to evaluate our training. If the desired improvement is not evident, we need to change something. Give thought to your training sessions. Keep a journal and track exercises done each session and the record the results. This will help you evaluate your progress. There are a multitude of training books and videos in the club library available to check out. You might not agree with everything you read or see, or the suggested training method might be irrelevant with your dog. However, the next time you instruct or assist a dog might be having a problem that something you saw or read would help them. Dog training has changed over the years and we as trainers can not stay static and never expand our knowledge base. You-tube is a good source of training videos. Go to a dog show or class without your dog to observe what other handlers are doing. Become a student of your dog and the competition events you participate.

Hard work doesn’t guarantee success but that’s what makes it challenging.

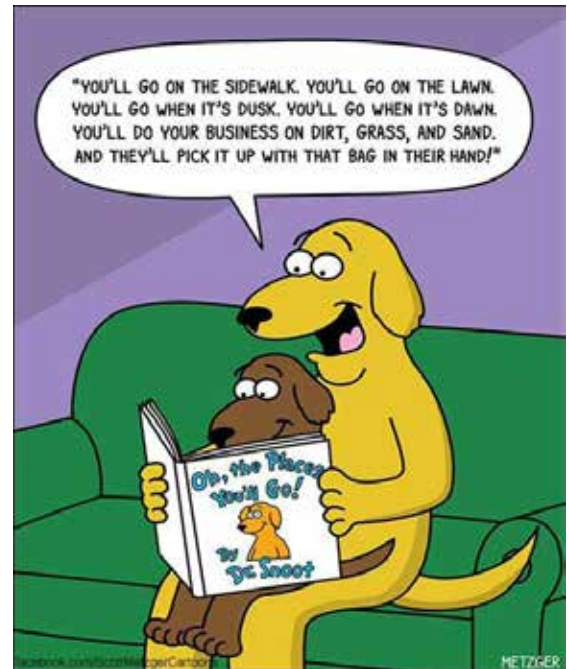

For persons sixteen (16) years or older who wish to work to accomplish the objectives of DTCDC and contribute their time to the tasks necessary to further these goals.

Only Active Members may vote at Club meetings. To remain an Active Member in good standing, a member should qualify yearly in one or more of the following ways:

- A. Serve as chair or working member of a DTCDC committee
- B. Perform tasks on behalf of DTCDC not formally assigned to a committee
- C. Serve as an instructor or an assistant in DTCDC training classes
- D. If elected, carry out the duties of a position on the Board

Legislative Liaison Update

National, State and Local

Texas Bills Regulating Hobbyists

[House Bill 2238](#) was heard on March 22 in the House Licensing and Administrative Procedures Committee. And Senate Bill 876 was heard on March 28 in the Senate Committee on Criminal Justice. Both bills were left pending in committee for now, but could still be scheduled for a vote in the coming weeks, so it is necessary to continue contacting the committees. A staff member from the AKC Government Relations team attended both hearings and testified against the bills.

AKC outreach efforts were successful as the sponsor State Representative Brad Buckley and State Senator Pete Flores received many calls in opposition to the bills. As a result, the sponsors have agreed to meet with AKC to discuss their concerns with the bills and

AKC has expressed their appreciation for their willingness to work with them. Currently, there is no need to continue to contact the sponsor's office in opposition to this legislation.

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Current Texas Kennel Law

In view of last month's article (March 2023 PawPrint) about the possible changes to licensing thresholds for breeders in Texas, here is a summary of current Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation (TDLR) rules.

License Requirement

You must be licensed, if you meet both of the following conditions:

- You possess 11 or more adult female dogs and/or cats that are capable of reproduction
- Within one calendar year, you sell, exchange, or offer to sell or exchange at least 20 dogs and/or cats
- Each adult female animal in your possession that is capable of reproduction will be presumed to be used for breeding purposes, unless you can establish, based upon breeding records or other evidence, that the animal is not used for breeding.

Persons who operate without a license may be subject to enforcement actions, including administrative penalties and sanctions in an amount up to \$5,000 per day for each violation.

TDLR implemented new rules for 2023 about the inspections TDLR conducts for licensed dog breeders in the State of Texas.

The adopted rules provide default procedures for inspections TDLR is authorized to conduct. They provide that:

1. TDLR may perform inspections with or without advance notice to ensure compliance with statute or rule, or as a result of a complaint;
2. Inspections will be performed during the regular operating hours of the location being inspected;
3. Upon completion of an inspection, the license holder, applicant, or representative will be provided with the results of the inspection in writing;
4. TDLR may use alternative inspection methods, including the use of videoconference technology, instead of conducting an in-person inspection; and
5. A license holder, applicant, or other person must cooperate in the performance of an inspection. Different or more specific procedures may be provided in individual program rules.

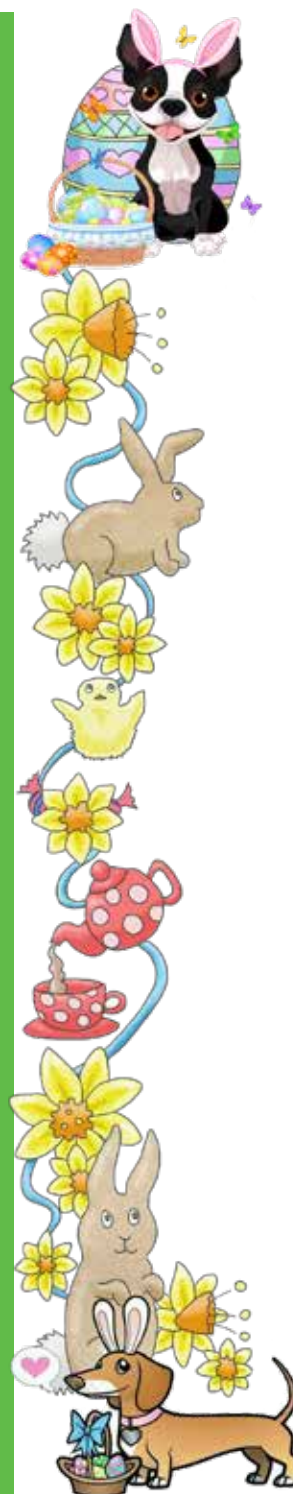

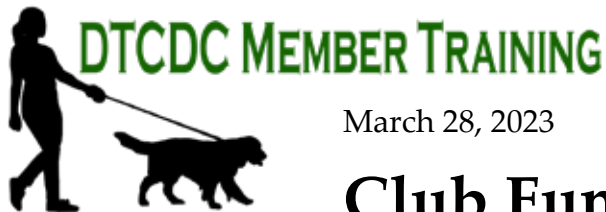

Club Fun and Games Night

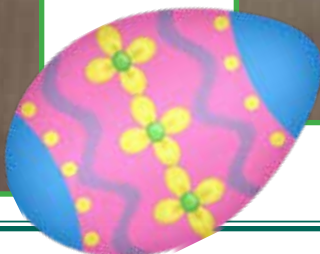

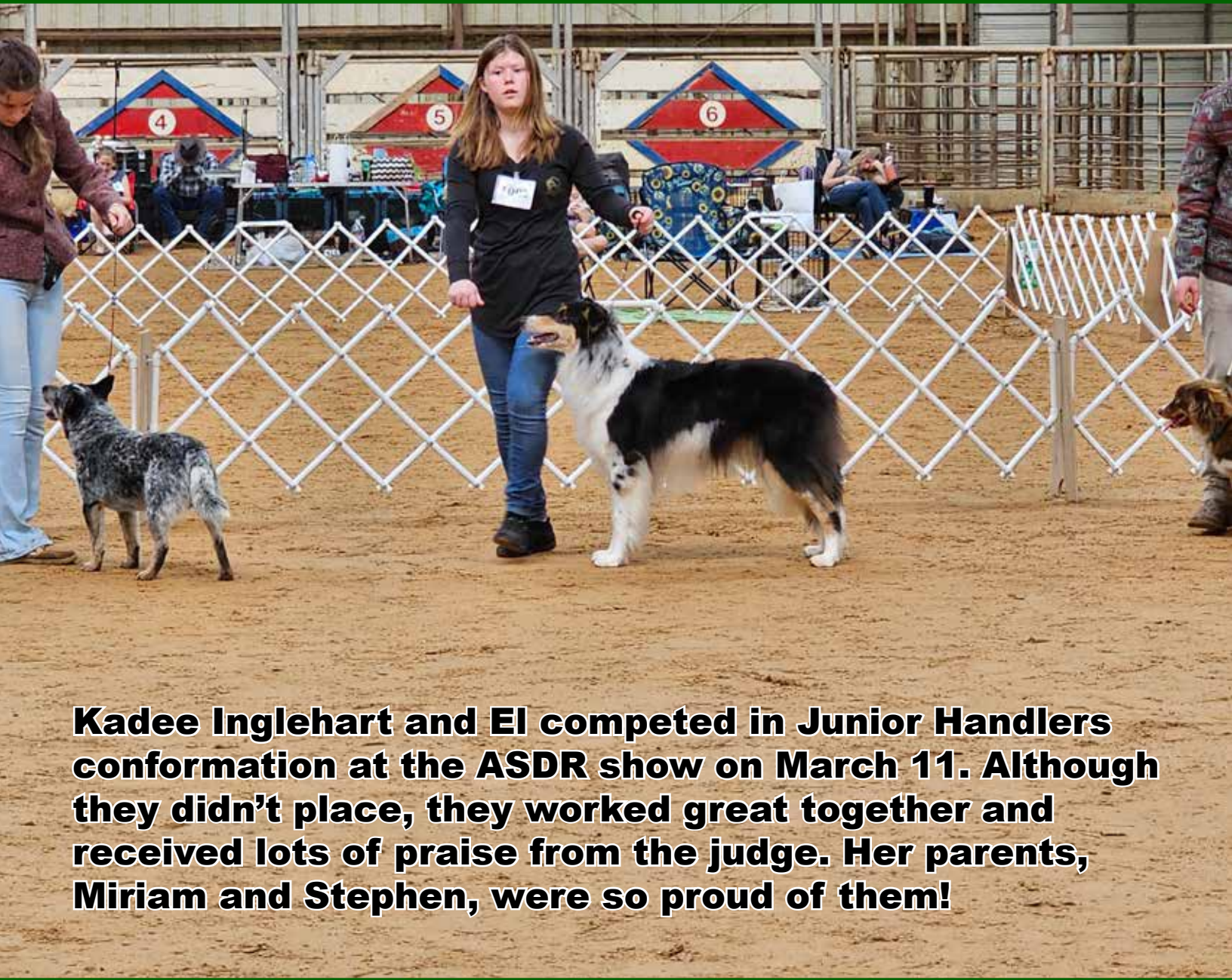

26. Go geocaching

Geocaching is a high-tech treasure hunt where players follow global positioning satellite (GPS) coordinates listed on the geocaching Web site in search of a cache (items hidden away for later). Geocaching has grown in popularity on the outdoor activity scene, and your dog can easily tag along! Find out more about geocaching

30. Practice clicker training

Clicker training involves using a small ticker device that produces a distinct sound, in order to train your dog to associate reward with specific good behavior.

31. Go for a picnic

Whether it's at the local park, beach or even in your backyard – one of the most Springy things to do with your dog is relaxing with an afternoon picnic!

32. Throw your dog a party

Is your dog's birthday coming up? Celebrate in style by throwing a birthday bash for them! You can invite your fellow dog owners and their pups, come up with party games, have some fun and even make a cake (if you eliminate the sugar and use doggie friendly ingredients.)



33. Do some dog-themed baking

You don't need an excuse to spoil your dog, so why not make some homemade pup-cakes or fun doggie treats? Just make sure that if you're baking for your dog, that you follow dog friendly recipes and use ingredients that are safe for canine consumption

34. Improve your canine knowledge

If you're passionate about dog welfare, have you considered going back to college and studying a qualification? From grooming and CPR, to dog walking and canine behavior – there are lots of short courses you could try. You never know, you could end up starting a new career working with dogs!

35. Read with your dog

There's nothing better than curling up in a comfy chair with a good book and immersing yourself into a new world, and it's one of the simplest things to do with your dog.



36. Watch a TV show or film together

A rainy day wouldn't be completed without a few hours spent snuggled up on the sofa, watching your favorite movies. What's more – the dog themed films and shows available on Netflix are endless!

37. Organize an event for charity

Organizing a dog-themed charity event is a great way for you to spend time with your pet as well as do something good for your community. You could organize a charity dog walk, make and sell your own doggie treats, host your own fun dog competition – and much more.

38. Visit the veterinarian

Not all dogs enjoy heading to the vets, but it's really important they get regular check ups to ensure they remain happy and healthy. You can make the experience more fun by building up comfort with social calls if needed, and head out for some fun activities and walks afterwards.

39. Go to the dog groomers

Treat your dog to a pamper at your local dog grooming such as at Petco or PetSmart or Pet Supplies Plus.



40. Play flyball

Any dog who likes to chase a ball will take to flyball naturally – the relay race requires a dog to race over four hurdles, catch a tennis ball that has been released from a spring-loaded launcher, and then race back over the hurdles again. It's a great way for your dog to burn up excess energy.

41. Have a go at Nosework (Ask Jan Hitchborn, Benita Zapata and Georgann Hughes)

Nose Work is an up-and-coming canine sport which is suitable for all kinds of dogs, including dogs with disabilities or behavioral problems. Similar to search and rescue work carried out by professional detection dogs, this sport involves the dog seeking out and finding different scents hidden in various environments, both indoors and outside. Teams are made up of one dog and one handler, which means nosework is a great way to bond with your dog.



42. Boost your trick training (Ask Michele Hosey)

Who says you can't teach an old dog new tricks? Teaching tricks is a great way to spend time with your dog. You can teach anything from the "basics" – sit, down, stay, wait, coming when called and walking on a loose leash – to more advanced and unusual tricks such as leg weaving, roll over and walking backwards.



43. Canicross

Canicross is the sport of cross-country running with dogs. The human drives the dog by directing them from behind with voice commands. Canicross is not only is a great method to get a human and a canine fit but works the dog's mind and allows them to use their brain in a work mode. Taking part in dog sports usually means you and your dog get to socialize with likeminded people but even if it's just you and your dog, you will be strengthening your bond with your dog which is very rewarding and great fun too. <https://www.akc.org/expert-advice/health/canicross-goes-beyond-running-with-dogs/>



44. Try Doga

Doga is a *human* yoga practice that helps support the natural bond we have with our dogs.

45. Take a nap with your dog

Having a nap with your dog will help to ease stress and anxiety. Plus – there's no one in the world that your dog loves more than you, so that little bit of extra snuggle time will make their day!

46. Play interactive games

Interactive games such as treat and puzzle games provide mental stimulation for your dog and can help cut down on problem behaviors such as excessive chewing or barking.



47. Attend a breed specific meet up

Breed-specific dog meetups offer dogs and their owners fun and camaraderie. Plus – the shared experience of owning the same breed of dog will offer lots of common ground to build on!

48. Enroll in a dog activity group

There are lots of different activity groups that you could get involved in, including walking and dog playgroups. Don't worry if your dog is new to the scene, as the majority of groups will welcome newbies! Not only is this a great way to meet new dog owners, but your furry friend will get to interact with other dogs too. Or participate in one of the club's upcoming events. (See [page 19](#).)

49. Appreciate your dog

Be thankful that you have your dog by your side, because they will love you unconditionally, make you laugh with their goofy habits, and most importantly – remind you to find joy in the simple things.

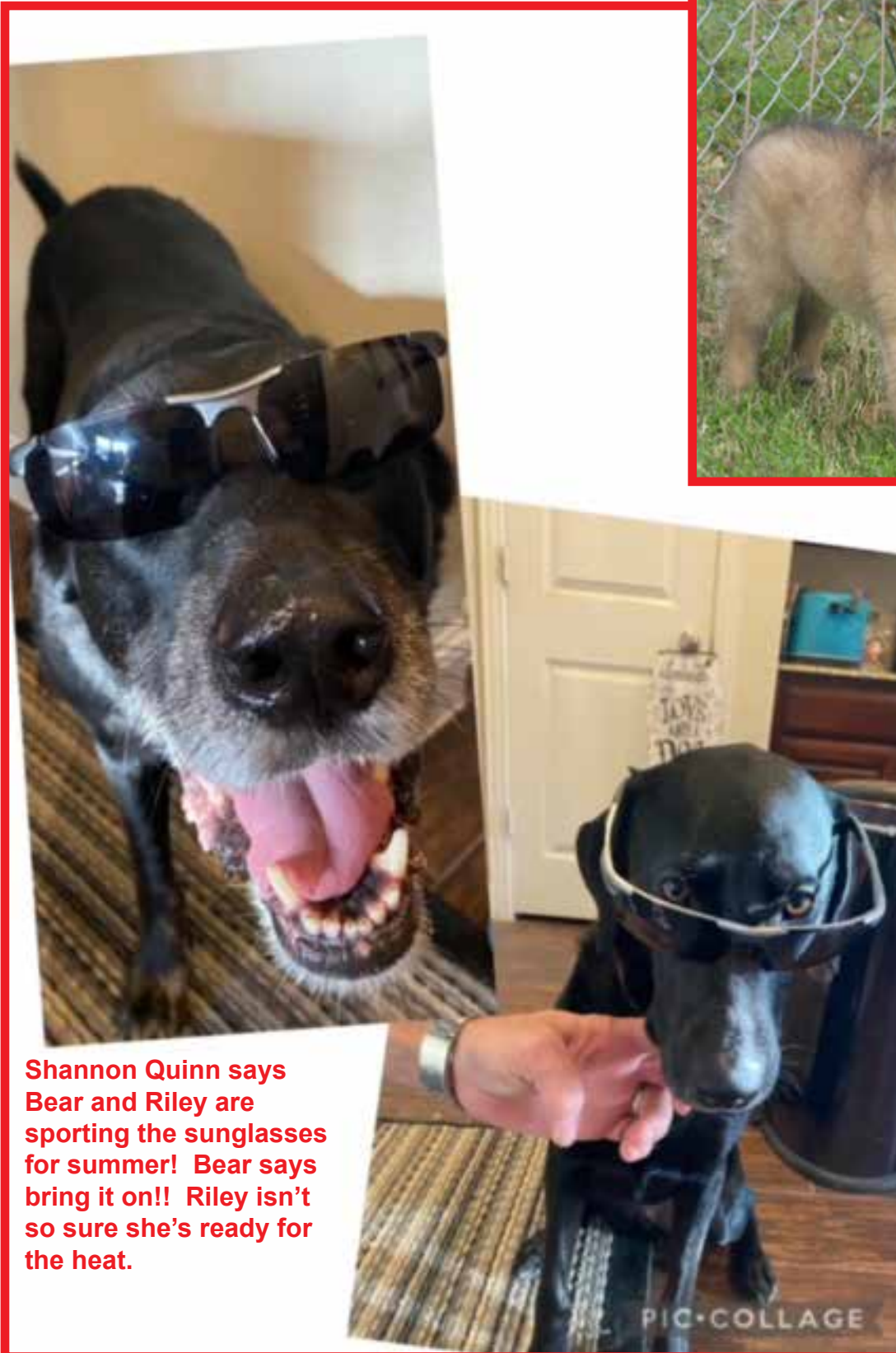

Nosework Update

In an advanced class recently, we worked on master and elite UKC container searches while discussing walking patterns and hides that can now be side by side or next to a food distraction also in a similar container. We are working the classes above any level they are currently trialing in and getting them familiar with what is down the road. It also makes their current trialing levels easier (we hope) for them, and gives the handler confidence, knowing they can nail a high level element. In the elite level an unknown human can be sitting or standing in the search field. The “distraction” must not acknowledge the dog. The dog can sniff but needs to move on. In the photo below we put the hide at

the feet of the human. I had this scenario presented at a class. My granddaughter was chosen to be the distraction. I knew Logan would ignore her but thought we would be toast with Skye. He surprised me and showed me once and for all that searching more important. We are proud to report every advanced dog in class that night totally ignored the human. The photos on this page are of Melissa and Gozer. (I have a neighbor with a Cane Corso who cannot believe this breed can do this.)





Here is Courtney and her pup Joey in their second ever nosework class. Joey is locating the “hide” and is starting to discern the difference between hot and cold scent while Courtney is learning to read her dog. All breeds can do nosework.

Parker is all in on nosework and thinks it is so much fun.

Teaching "Sit Pretty"



“Sit pretty” is a trick that starts off with your dog in a regular sitting position, then ends with their front legs raised up. Because not all dogs have the same physique, practicing this trick may take several tries until they’re comfortable and confident.

First, ask your dog to sit. Then, raise your treat slightly over their head while extending your arm for them to use for support. As they rise, they will likely lean on you to situate themselves into the “sit pretty” position, which is when you can reward them. Try this a couple of more times, eventually removing your arm so that they can balance on their own. Attach your verbal cue to the trick.
