

A Word from Our President




ear Members,

Train the Trainer Held 4/15

This month we looked at different ways to teach the stand exercise. Traditionally many trainers taught dogs to move forward into a stand and, if you never plan to go any further than Novice level obedience, this will work.

Recently, I have worked with several people who decided to try Open Obedience after they finished their dog's CD. In these higher levels the dog must stand while staying in heel position and moving forward to a stand can be substantial point deductions or even non-qualifying. This means that the stand must be totally retrained - confusing for the dog and frustrating for the handler.

Pam White showed us several ways to use the "go to mat exercise" to help teach many advanced obedience exercises. Yes, the same "go to mat exercise" that we teach in our puppy and beginner classes, can be used to help teach obedience exercises required for Open and Utility competition.

Also included was another example of using "Shaping and Capturing" to teach off lead heeling with an automatic sit. I am trying to get one of our advanced obedience competitors to give a demonstration for May Train The Trainer on 05/20/2025.





A Note from Your Training Director



The old saying "April showers bring May flowers" can be a little different in Texas. We tend to have April and May showers that bring severe thunderstorms, floods, hail and even tornados. This is the time of year to prepare for the safety of you and your pets.

For most of us the severe weather may only bring inconvenience (canceled classes), damage to trees, or maybe hail damage to roofs and cars. But in the rare instance when you need to take shelter, or even evacuate your home, having quick access to a bag packed with food, water, leashes, medications and copies of

shot records can be lifesaving. If you are not lucky enough to have a storm shelter in your own home, check before you need them to see which of your community shelters are "pet friendly." The last, and maybe most important preparation, is to prepare your pet for this situation. Teaching your dog to be okay with strangers, crowded conditions, and stressful situations could save his life. So, come to class, socialize, crate train and even get your dog's Canine Good Citizen (CGC).

Ring Manners for Rally and Obedience Competition

A KC judges are expected to judge x number of dogs per hour. The number varies depending on the class and whether it is obedience or rally. This is how the superintendent comes up with your class time.

Judges try to keep a reasonable schedule and still be gracious enough to answer questions, etc.

This past weekend, I witnessed numerous rally exhibitors who must not be aware of this. I'm not sure if ring preparations is taught in class, so I hope these suggestions help to put your best foot forward.

When you check in ringside and get your armband number, check to see if you are in the beginning, middle or end of the classs. This will give you an idea when you need to take your dog out to potty.


If you are in the middle or last part you will want to check back a couple times to see if dogs before you are absent or moved to a different spot.

Once you know how many dogs are before you, it is a good idea to identify the

two dogs before you by breed or owner. Look around and see if you can find the exhibitors with those numbered arm bands.

When the dog two places in front of you is in the ring, it is a good time to take your dog out of his crate. Give him a moment to look around, stretch, then maybe do a few warm up exercises, like fronts, finish or rally moves you can do in the small space in front of your crate.

When the dog directly in front of you enters the ring, is a good time to move closer to the entrance aisle, maybe practice a little heeling. DO NOT go to the ring entrance or close enough to interfere with the dog in the ring, but close enough that the stewards are aware you are present.



You never know when a dog might be excused, decide to exit the right, or in case of obedience, do a "Do Over" and is now finished. So keep an eye on the ring while you are getting your dog in working mode.

When the other dog has exited the ring, move within a few feet of the ring and get your dog focused on you.

When your number is called, smartly heel into the ring and set up!

This sets a much better tone than the late exhibitor, who rushes into the ring, dragging the startled, confused dog, and faces the slightly annoyed judge! They are sabotaging the performance before it even starts!

You and your dog are a team. If you expect him to perform correctly you must do your part.







On Monday, April 28, the Texas House Public Health Committee considered House Bill 2806, which would dramatically broaden the definition of a "dangerous dog" and make it a misdemeanor offense if a dog causes "bodily injury." Under the Texas Penal Code, "bodily injury" is defined as physical pain, illness, or any impairment of physical condition.

The American Kennel Club (AKC) is deeply concerned that the proposed changes in HB 2806 are overly broad and could have far-reaching consequences for responsible dog owners across Texas. As written, this bill could result in misdemeanor charges for owners whose dogs are not truly dangerous, such as when a playful puppy nips or a dog causes accidental, minor discomfort. This approach fails to distinguish between genuinely dangerous behavior and normal, non-aggressive canine actions, and could unfairly penalize responsible pet owners.

HB 2806 remains pending in the House Public Health Committee, and a vote could be taken at any time in the coming weeks. We urge all concerned dog owners and advocates for responsible pet ownership to contact members of the House Public Health Committee and respectfully express your opposition to this overly broad and potentially harmful legislation. Retail Pet Sales Ban

Last week, House Bill 3458, which would impose a statewide ban on the retail sale of dogs and cats, was voted out of the Texas House Trade, Workforce, and Economic Development Committee by a vote of 10-1. The bill now advances to the Texas House Calendars Committee, where it awaits scheduling for a vote by the full Texas House of Representatives.

The American Kennel Club (AKC) strongly opposes HB 3458. A statewide ban on the retail sale of pets, while claiming to improve animal welfare, would in fact drive the market underground and increase the trafficking of unhealthy pets to unsuspecting consumers. Such a measure does not address the root causes of irresponsible breeding or animal mistreatment, but instead removes regulated, transparent avenues for Texans to obtain pets. The AKC urges all concerned Texas residents to contact their state representatives and respectfully express opposition to this misguided legislation.



Rest His Chin in Your Hand

Step One

Hold your palm flat and facing upwards in front of your dog. Hold a treat in your other hand above and just behind your palm. Let your dog come to you to get the treat. They should be placing their chin over your palm, but they don't have to touch it yet. Mark and reward your dog as soon as their chin is over your palm.

Step Two

Once your dog is comfortably coming for the treats, you can lure them to the palm of your hand. Position your hands as before, but now, as your dog brings their nose towards the treat, lower the treat until their chin is in your hand. Then, mark and let them eat the treat as their chin rests on your palm.

Step Three

Next, you need to fade the lure. As before, hold your fingers behind your open palm, but now they should be empty. When your dog pushes their chin into your palm, mark the behavior, then grab a treat from your pocket or a treat pouch. If possible, try to provide the treat while your dog's chin is

still in your palm to further reinforce that position. If your dog will only perform the behavior if you have a treat in your hand, try rubbing your fingers with a smelly treat, so they smell like food even though there's nothing there. If your dog refuses to move away from your hand because that's where the good stuff is, reset them by tossing a treat on the floor a few feet away.

Step Four

Hold out your palm without any finger lure at all and see if your dog places their chin in your hand. If you've reinforced the position enough, they should no longer need the lure. Your turned-up palm should have become the hand signal for the behavior. If not, do a few more repetitions with an empty lure before trying again. Only add a verbal cue like "chin" after your dog is responding reliably without the lure. Simply say the word right before you hold out your palm so your dog links the two signals.

Step Five

Once your dog will reliably and enthusiastically place their chin in your hand, begin to add duration by delaying your marker and reward. You can also begin to add your release cue when the behavior is finished. Don't ask for more than a second or two at first, and as you build duration, go slowly

and intersperse shorter intervals with longer ones, so you aren't pushing your dog too far, too fast.

Step Six

When your dog will hold their chin in your hand for a reasonable amount of time, go back to asking for only a second of duration but begin to add the kinds of distractions you expect your dog might face. For example, move your other hand around your dog's head, use your other hand to gently lift your dog's ears, or hold a bottle of eye drops above their eyes. Mark and reward your dog for staying still despite these distractions.

TERRI CLARY MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

In keeping with the club's mission and in recognition of the hard work of both dog and handler, the Terri Clary Memorial Scholarship is awarded to the canine/handler pair that has made the most progress overcoming significant training challenges. This Scholarship allows dog and handler to come back to the next session of beginner obedience classes, free of charge, to allow them both to meet their goals.

Junior Scholarship

A club member has annonymously given \$1000 to start a Junior Scholarship and have this open to other members donating to keep it going. Eligible young people age 16 or younger with a GPA (Grade Point Average) of 3.0 are eligible. The student may receive it twice and will be eligible to receive help for their first year of membership in the club. 


