

Sessions Schedule for 2018

SESSION 5 (Begins August 5 and ends September17) SESSION 6 (Begins September 30 and ends November 9)

Instructor/Assistant Corner:

T he most common mistake made when using a marker (whether a word or clicker) is marking the behavior too late. The whole reason a marker is superior to just delivering the reward is that the act of delivering the reward changes the dog's behavior. He moves his head or body to get the treat and you are no longer reinforcing the perfect behavior you wanted.

Using markers allows us to consistently tell the dog the instant he does the behavior that he is right and then it no longer matters if he move or does something else before the reward is delivered.

BUT, big BUT here, the timing of the marker is critical. The marker needs to happen WHILE the dog is doing the behavior, not after. For example, when marking the sit, mark it the instant the dog's butt touches the ground, not when he settles into the sit. (Later you can use markers to gain duration but that is another topic.)



There is a great demo you can use to teach your students the correct timing of the marker. Jeff Young has been using it in his class for some time and it is starting to spread to other instructors as well. I thought I would share it with all of you.

You can use any object – a dog's toy, a pencil. Don't choose anything that will make a loud noise and startle the dogs or a really distracting toy like a ball. Hold the object out at about shoulder height and instruct your students to "mark" the instant the object hits the ground. Drop the object.

You will hear markers used at the time the object hits the ground and some 1-2 seconds after the object hits the ground. There may even be one or two who did not mark at all.

I find it helpful to mark it myself as well so the students can hear that they are late compared to my mark. Practice several times until the students can do it. Have fun with it!

Course Descriptions for Offered Classes

Puppy Class:

Our Puppy Class is for pups 9 weeks through 5 months of age. The puppy owner will learn to use positive methods to teach the puppy good manners and to build a bond of love and respect. The pup is socialized with other puppies and people and taught exercises to build confidence when meeting new situations and objects. The puppy will learn to come when called, sit, lie down, stand, and not pull on the leash while walking. They are also taught to settle and be touched and examined by both the owner and a stranger. The instructor leads discussions on Jumping Up, Home



Training Problems, Nutrition, Grooming, Crate Training, Spay/Neutering and other subjects to help the puppy's family become responsible pet owners. Puppies are also taught the meaning of "Off", to remove themselves from furniture, etc. Instructions for teaching some tricks (roll over, etc.) are included to give the puppy and handler additional "training fun" and to let the dog "show off." "Authorized AKC S.T.A.R. Puppy Training Provider"

Beginner Class:

Our Beginner Class is for dogs six months and older. Students learn how to become benevolent leaders and to teach their dogs exercises including attention, controlled walking in heel position, sit, down, stand, fast recalls, walking among a crowd, stay, door and gate manners and an introduction to tricks.

Foundation Skills:







Foundation Skills is for students who wish to continue working with their dogs, develop better teamwork and impulse control as well as to start training for competitive obedience/rally or to earn AKC Canine Good Citizen (CGC) titles.

Admission is restricted to those who have satisfactorily completed a Beginner class and received recommendation from the Instructor to attend OR have approval of the Training Director. Dogs will remain in this class until they have received recommendation from the Foundation Skills Instructor to move on to the Competitive Class or Novice Rally. Canine Good Citizen tests will be scheduled for the week following the last week of class for an additional fee of \$10 for members and \$20 for non-members.

Advanced Classes:

For information about our advanced obedience classes please contact the Training Director. Click on "Contact Us" and make your selection.

A) Novice Polish Obedience

Is for handlers who wish to train their dogs for competitive obedience or those who just want to continue training beyond the Foundation Skills class. The class is intended to prepare dogs/handlers for competition in Beginner Novice and Novice classes. Admission is limited to those dogs that have:

- 1) Received recommendation from the Foundation Skills Instructor
- 2) Received a recommendation from the Training Director

B) Beginner and Advanced Open and Utility

Classes are available for those who wish to compete in the sport of Obedience beyond the Companion Dog (CD) level. Contact the Training Director regarding these classes.

C) Novice Rally (Limited Classes)

Is for dogs that have completed the Foundation Skills class and received recommendation from the Instructor to attend or have the approval of the Training Director. Dogs will remain in this class until they have earned the Novice Rally title from the AKC, ASCA or UKC.

D) Advanced Rally (Limited Classes)

Will prepare the handler/dog for competing for Rally titles beyond Novice. Admission is restricted to dogs that have received the Novice Rally title in AKC, ASCA or UKC.

E) Masters Rally (Limited Class)

This class is for dogs preparing to compete in Rally at the Masters level.

<u>F) Conformation</u> – drop in class available. Please call for information.

New Opportunities:

G) Beginner Nosework:

Want a fun class that doesn't require a lot of prior training? Nosework is a new sport where dogs are trained to find certain odors in various elements. Sniffing is one of the greatest joys in a dog's life, yet we rarely allow them to do it. This class is a great confidence builder for dogs, offers an outlet for older and retired dogs, and provides mental stimulation for ALL dogs. Dogs will become proficient on their first target odor and will learn how to be "odor obedient" even in the face of distractions. The class is run seminar style where all dogs are crated when it is not their turn to work so owners will need to bring their dog's crate.

If your dog has a working nose and LOVES food, come join us!!! Whether you plan to compete, or just want to have fun with your dog – Nosework fits the bill. Beginner class is a prerequisite and Foundation Skills is recommended.

H) Advanced Nosework

This class focuses on preparing handlers/dogs to compete in the sport of nosework. Your dog is a candidate for this class if:

- 1) Your dog has been recommended by the Beginner Nosework Instructor.
- 2) Your dog has earned Nosework titles in any level in UKC, NASCW, PSD, or AKC
- 3) Your dog is tested and recommended by the DTCDC Advanced Nosework Instructor

The Instructors will set up unique courses each week for teams to run and work on all elements (weather permitted for exteriors and vehicles) at all levels. The class will concentrate on the introduction of distraction odors, blank rooms, detailing, advanced handling techniques, and extended searches. The class is run seminar style where all dogs are crated when it is not their turn to work so owners will need to bring their dogs crate.

If you are serious about competing, then this is the class for you!

I) Masters Nosework

This class is for competitors who have earned the first two levels of nosework titles and are preparing for the more advanced levels. Your dog is a candidate for this class if:

- 1) Your dog has been recommended by the Advanced Nosework Instructor.
- 2) Your dog has earned Advanced Nosework titles in UKC, NASCW, PSD or AKC.
- 3) Your dog is tested and recommended by the DTCDC Masters Nosework Instructor.

J) Trick Dog Class



Students will learn the skills needed to teach tricks suitable for earning the new AKC Trick Dog titles. Foundation Skills class or approval by the Training Director is required and space is limited.

DTCDC Suggestion Box



The board responds to your questions and suggestions placed in the DTCDC Suggestion Box.

Suggestion submitted: "Go back to 8-week sessions! 6 weeks is not enough time!"

I opted to wait and let 6 weeks have its fair test so the 2018 schedule has been set with 6-week sessions. I invite all feedback on the topic but please include concrete reasons. What are your observations that cause you to feel 6 weeks is not enough time?

I had heard "it is not enough time" and "students are not learning the material in 6 weeks" so I have been attending the first and last classes of most puppy and beginner classes and assisted a puppy class. My observation is that if students come to class and work with the dog at home, they are learning the material in 6 weeks. What are your observations?

Students new to training usually need two Beginner classes – the first to learn themselves and the second to teach the dog. This is true for the 8-week sessions as well and I am not seeing that the 6-week sessions are any different. What has your experience been with this?

The Training Committee will be requesting more feedback soon on this issue prior to proposing the 2019 schedule.

Suggestion Submitted: "Anything as important as the correction policy should be put before the membership for a vote – not decided solely by the Board."

The current Board has been diligent to report to the membership in the Paw Print and in membership meetings what they are discussing and working on. Obedience 101 for Dummies

I was asked if I would write up a piece on obedience as no other articles had been submitted. So once again I will lead you on a personal journey. This time in obedience.

First, I do want to say that I always took a basic beginner class in obedience for all my past dogs. I always wanted a dog who knew the basic commands, had leash and social manners and I could count on as a reliable good family dog. My dogs all got the basic CGC title but that was the extent. I felt I had enough knowledge to work with dogs we fostered for rescues and for the new ones we took on

to be family members no matter if they were a puppy or an adult dog. Then came Skye!

Skye was an eight-week-old puppy who cried for the entire hour and a half ride home late September 2014. She was "adopted" by one of my senior golden girls, Abbie, who set about teaching her puppy social manners. The two bonded immediately. Abbie had been diagnosed in August with a hemangiosarcoma in the upper abdomen and three weeks after Skye came into our family her "mommy, Abbie", passed away. The other furry family members just let Skye run all over them, take their toys and in other words as time passed by Skye was a cute 10-12 pound bully. I had heard about a dog training club in Duncanville years before and decided to research it and see where it was located. Imagine my surprise to find it was only a stone's throw from my home. In December of 2014 I got the okay to enroll Skye in the January 2015 beginner obedience class even though she would not be six months old until January 26th.

On that first Monday night class, little did I realize how that one class would not only change the life Skye was to lead, as well as that of my other dogs, but would change my life drastically. My husband was terminally ill. Retirement as I had pictured it was not going to be as I had thought. Even future thoughts of new things we planned to do would not be feasible.

Well that came back to bite me big time when I did get interested in competing. It is still at times an issue with Skye but not often. We still work on it and just this year Skye has grown tremendously, possibly more because I have grown.

After Skye's beginner class, I stopped classes with her and brought Logan in for beginner, then intermediate. I returned in the Fall of 2015 to intermediate with Skye and we took it three times learning different skills from three different instructors. It was at this time Pam Crystal started a new intermediate styled class which introduced Rally and CGC prep. Back came Logan in the middle of the first session of this class to get his CGC followed by CGCA and CGCU. Skye was in the next new intermediate class and she got her CGC and CGCA as did Maggie. I got hooked on Rally. I started taking Rally classes with Robin Quintana and stepped

out early to trial in the ASCA trials in Azle. The hook was set!

It was Fall of 2016 that I met Peggy Phelps at one of our early ASCA trials and overheard she gave private lessons. I was pushing to start beginner obedience too, so I approached her. I was fascinated watching the dogs in Open and Utility. I started with her one on one with both Skye and Maggie. I continued classes at DTCDC. It became painfully apparent that the weakest link in my rally and obedience partnerships was me.

Nosework hooked me first. In nosework the handler learns to be the quiet one letting the dog work out the search and find. Don't ask me why but I felt obedience needed to be serious. That I needed to give commands and the dog would learn to blindly perform. Ha! I was serious in Rally (actual truth be told, I was petrified at first doing both). I have been very fortunate that the folks in the dog world or at least at DTCDC are patient and willing to give suggestions for one to try. Over time things started to come together. Once I understood my body and posture were being read by the dogs (often we were not on the same page!), I started trying to get me right. I started to understand why Skye (she is the one who loves rally and obedience) did what she did. A couple months ago I told a few folks that if I were Skye I wouldn't want to train with me as I was no fun! Not sure what happened, but I think the biggest factor in my growth was Peggy got a puppy and she started demoing things with

this puppy for me and my ears finally got into the act actually listening to her happy voice and encouragements and praise while doing her exercises with Chase. After 18 months with Peggy, countless intermediate, rally and novice club classes and almost every SNG making sure to do two runs, I have found my silly voice, my happy voice but then I am conflicted as to when I can use it and when I can't. The one constant command I hear from all of you at the SNGs is SMILE! Look happy. Oh yeah – walk faster!! From Peggy it is to be a cheerleader and tell Skye when she has done it right. The word "yes" in a happy high-pitched voice has worked wonders. I



am learning to call and give commands like it is Christmas not like a Drill Sargent giving orders to recruits. Rally is still easier, but we are progressing in obedience. As I get better, Skye soars forward. I am blown away at what she is now doing and doing with enjoyment.

Now if I can just get my hands to cooperate as we progress into Utility exercises. Skye is close to doing all commands with either hand signals or verbal only. I am very expressive with my hands when I talk. I also at first mixed up what hand to do what command. But I must be careful about moving my hands around in between because Skye watches me like a hawk. One day as she sat, she stood up, took a step, started to down – I caught this out of the corner of my eye. I had put her in a sit but was asking questions and my right hand was moving around and my poor girl was trying hard to figure out what the heck I was wanting her to do.

What has getting involved and training in obedience taught me? It has first and foremost taught me patience. I can remember my despair at teaching Skye my non-retrieving dog the dumbbell and hearing how for some of my mentors it took a year or more for their dogs to hold and walk with it. I persevered working just a few minutes a day and one morning almost a year to the day, Skye decided this thing was good to hold, pick up and then to walk with and now retrieves on the flat and jumps over obstacles to get it and return. Patience has expanded into all parts of my dog training and personal life. Maggie in nosework is a new beneficiary of my patience. Getting hooked on obedience has made me brave. Yes – brave to go to trials, brave to get behind the wheel and drive, often alone, hours to go to a trial. Not only has obedience helped with this but all of you who have done this for years have been an inspiration. Flat out I am a better me because of being involved in all of this. I have rediscovered my inner fun child and it comes out in my training with my kiddos. I love seeing their eyes light up and enjoyment spread over them when we are practicing or at a trial.

The long and short of it for me is that being involved with obedience has been as beneficial for me as it has been for my dogs. I am still a work in progress, but the pieces are fitting together. I can no longer imagine life without it in our lives and all the dog sports it has introduced to us.

Tips for Obedience Training and Showing

As an instructor it is my job to impart as much information to my students as possible. Sometimes we forget a few things. I am going to try and add some things that I may have forgotten to tell you.

- 1. Keep your dog close to you at all times both in and out of the ring. Do not let them get to far out on the leash. Bad things can happen. Rocket loves to jump in peoples' lap.
- 2. Make a list of what you need to take with you. Check it twice to be sure you have not forgotten anything.
- 3. Be sure to pick up after your dog.
- 4. Keep your dog back from the ring at least 10 feet when you are warming up. If there is an area away from the ring use that for your warm up. No squeaky toys near the rings.
- 5. Plan your warm up and be consistent.
- 6. Work your dog as much as you can. You get what you put into it.
- 7. Work your attention before you go into the ring and every day.
- 8. Most important thing for you to remember. ----You are taking the best dog home with you.




