## A Word from Our President

Remembering our Vets. Each year we celebrate Memorial Day in honor of the many veterans who died while serving in the U.S. military. In the world of dogs, vet, as short for veterinarian, has another meaning, the medical provider for our beloved pets.

A couple of years ago I changed vets as the one I had gone to for 15 years was retiring. This new one was recommended by an old friend and, although much further from my house, I decided to follow her recommendation. I slowly transferred one dog over at a time as their shots and check-ups came due. Outside of an ear infection and weird rash, all the visits were fairly normal with nothing that was really serious. I was satisfied with the services, pricing and communications. I accepted the vet that was available. I wasn't real happy when I couldn't go in with my dogs (Covid restrictions), but all the veterinary facilities were keeping the humans in the parking lots.



Then a few weeks ago, Simon, our 12+ year old rescue cattle dog mix developed a very large and rapidly growing tumor under his back leg. He had been exhibiting signs of arthritis for over a year, but his gait became impaired very quickly. This time, I requested the lead vet, I wanted the best and most experienced. The surgery was in the afternoon and when I called at 5:45 p.m., I was told the vet would call me a little later. At 6:30 p.m. she called, Simon was not doing well, and she didn't want to leave him unattended overnight. I could come get him and take him home or send him to an emergency clinic for the night. I chose to go get him, but I also knew they closed at 6 p.m. She said they'd wait. I got there after 7 p.m., and not only the vet, but the vet tech, the office manager and another employee were all there waiting and helped get Simon in the truck. The vet called again after I got home to make

sure Simon was okay and gave me her personal cell number. She then called at 7:30 a.m. the next morning to check on him and said I could bring him back for the day to be monitored and put on fluids.

It's the tough times that can put a relationship to the test. I have such gratitude for the genuine caring and interest of this vet and her staff. I have no doubt that all of their patients are treated with this level of care.

This Memorial holiday, Simon should finally be rid of the cone of shame and although still pretty gimpy, he will have a bit longer on earth to share with us.

We could not do this without all of our volunteers so I am sending out a huge THANK YOU to all the session 3 instructors, assistants, my fellow training committee members and to Mary Ann Magness who stepped up and covered Novice Polish one night. I also wanted to let everyone know, next on the Training Committee's agenda is figuring out how to do a virtual train-the-trainer session; details to come.



## We have some upcoming events on the horizon:

1. We have been invited to attend the AKC Meet the Breeds on August 21-22 at the Kay Baily Hutchison Convention Center. They have requested a few Nosework and Obedience demos. If you are interested in attending with your dog (either as a demo dog, or to staff the booth) please let me know. I do not have exact times as of yet. 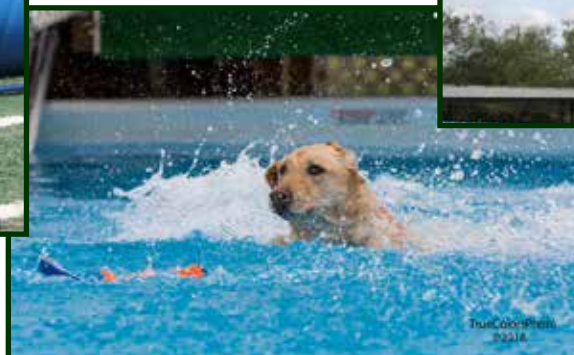

## Play Soccer

Soccer requires only the use of one's feet, so it's a good choice for a doggone fun game. Dogs are naturals when it comes to playing soccer, which makes it all the more fun to teach. Choose a soccer ball a bit larger than your dog's mouth so that they won't attempt to swallow it. Using a larger ball will also prevent him from picking it up and running away with it (a foul in dog soccer). Also, choose an empty park or a garden so that your dog doesn't chase other kids instead. And make sure you take a bag of treats along with you to reward her whenever she dribbles well.

1. Get her acquainted with the soccer ball, by giving it to her and allowing her to smell it. If she begins to move the ball by herself, praise her immediately and give a treat. If she isn't interested, you can begin by rolling the ball gently toward her while you encourage her how to play.
2. Encourage your dog by praising her every time she touches the ball with her nose or paw. It might take several trips to the park to finally make her dribble the ball like a pro, in the end you will see that it is totally worth it.
3. Once she is comfortable with the concept, start kicking the ball farther away from you and encouraging her to dribble it back to you. End by rewarding her with a treat so that she'll play with you next time.

Maya left this earth on Tuesday May 18, 2021. On Friday May 7th, I noticed she was favoring her right hind leg. She was not holding it up like it was hurt but she wasn't putting any weight on it. She was leaning against the chair leg to help her stand up. Hoping it was a pulled muscle etc, I kept her crated, resting until Tuesday May 11. She was not getting any better so I took her to our primary vet. They diagnosed it as a torn ACL and sent her home with pain meds. Wednesday morning Maya could not stand up. Her bal-

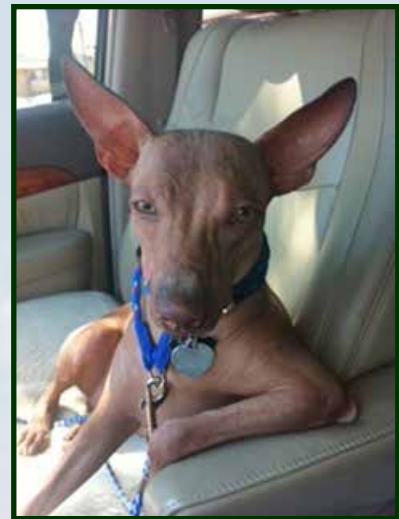


ance was gone. My primary vet couldn't see her until Friday so I rushed her to MedVet ER. She was diagnosed with Vestibular Disease – Central and Degenerative Valve Disease – Mitral & Tricuspid. My primary vet had told me she had a heart murmur about 4 years ago and each year said they heard it but the primary vet never said we needed to do anything about it. Med-Vet ER rated the murmur as a 4.5/6 and immediately got her on heart medication with many restrictions. Because of her heart and because it hadn't been on medication, we could not do a MRI to





figure out the Vestibular neurological disease. Maya proceeded to get worse every day and started having seizures which increased each day. She couldn't stand at all. She really didn't know where she was. She slept for most hours each day with her head on my shoulder as I held her close. Tuesday, she refused any food or water and was extremely lethargic. I took her back to MedVet. They decided since no improvement and it just seemed to be getting worse that she had a tumor on the brain, cancer of the brain and/or having strokes. I held her tight. I kissed her nose and she licked my chin. I told her how much I love her, how much I'll miss her – but that she was going to go to sleep. I prayed with her and told her I'll see her again someday. She was put to sleep at 12:20 p.m.



She was a true “Velcro” Xoloitzcuintli. She NEVER left my side at home. She had to be touching me no matter what I was doing – brushing my teeth, drying my hair, cooking, gardening. She slept with me with her rear in my chest and her body along my side with her head at my knee. Every morning my knee would get a bath/kisses from her tongue. She loved to sleep in...she would cuddle until almost noon if I'd stay in the bed that long. Because of her complete attachment, because of her total unconditional love, because of her intelligence, she is greatly missed. Maya was a great dog - my heart dog and I will never forget her.

I thank each one of you that helped Maya and me in our journey. She was a very intelligent dog. A dog that was leery of people when we started training, ended up having many friends at the club. If she

came up to you, you were her friend. She did not generalize. She picked each person she decided to like so you are special! Thank you all!!

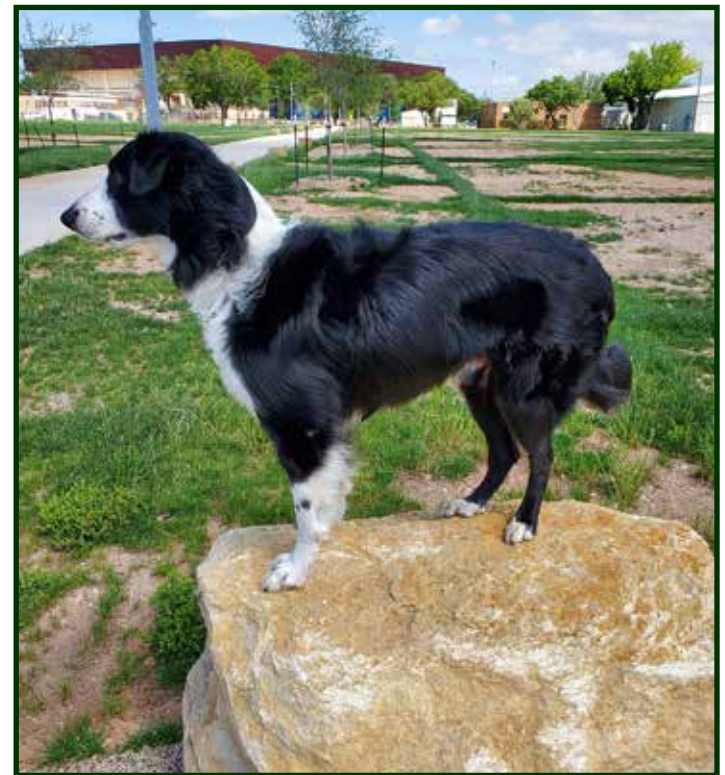


He also earned a 1<sup>st</sup> place in Masters Exteriors. This was all Gabe! He was CONFIDENT and I trusted him.

You may know some of these already, and others may be more of a "wait, really?" situation, but we think you'll find all of them entertaining. Check out these 30 fun dog facts.



1. The Labrador Retriever has been on the AKC's top 10 most popular breeds list for 30 consecutive years—longer than any other breed.
2. A dog's nose print is unique, much like a person's fingerprint.
3. Forty-five percent of U.S. dogs sleep in their owner's bed.
4. Speaking of sleeping ... all dogs dream, but puppies and senior dogs dream more frequently than adult dogs.



5. Seventy percent of people sign their dog's name on their holiday cards.
6. A dog's sense of smell is legendary, but did you know that his nose has as many as 300 million receptors? In comparison, a human nose has about 5 million.
7. Rin Tin Tin, the famous German Shepherd, was nominated for an Academy Award.
8. Dogs' noses can sense heat/thermal radiation, which explains why blind or deaf dogs can still hunt.
9. Only one breed that was among the five most popular breeds in 1934— the Beagle — still remains in the top five today.

10. The name Collie means "black." (Collies once tended black-faced sheep.)

11. Yawning is contagious—even for dogs. Research shows that the sound of a human yawn can trigger one from your dog. And it's four times as likely to happen when it's the yawn of a person he knows.

12. The Dandie Dinmont Terrier is the only breed named for a fictional person—a character in the novel *Guy Mannering*, by Sir Walter Scott.

13. Dogs curl up in a ball when sleeping to protect their organs—a hold over from their days in the wild, when they were vulnerable to predator attacks.

14. The Basenji is not technically "barkless," as many people think. They can yodel.





15. The Australian Shepherd is not actually from Australia—they are an American breed.
16. ... And the Labrador Retriever is originally from Newfoundland.
17. Human blood pressure goes down when petting a dog. And so does the dog's.
18. There are over 75 million pet dogs in the U.S.—more than in any other country.
19. A person who hunts with a Beagle is known as a "Beagler."

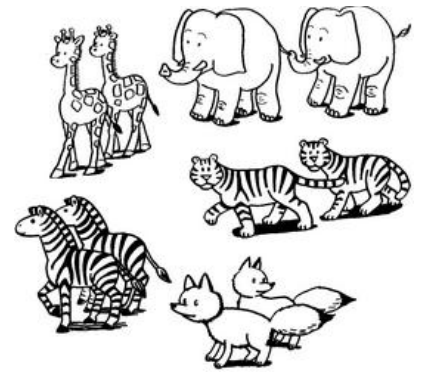
20. Dogs are not colorblind. They can see blue and yellow.

27. Greyhounds can beat cheetahs in a race. While cheetahs can run twice as fast as greyhounds, they can only maintain that 70 mph speed for about thirty seconds. A Greyhound can maintain a 35 mph speed for about seven miles. So, the cheetah may start out first, but the greyhound will soon overtake him.
28. The Bloodhound's sense of smell is so accurate that the results of its tracking can be used as evidence in a court of law.
29. Some dogs are taller or heavier, but according to the Guinness World Records, a Mastiff named Zorba is the world's overall largest dog ever. Zorba weighed 343 pounds and measured over eight feet from his nose to his tail. He's been described as being about the size of a small donkey.

30. According to the Guinness World Records, the smallest dog ever recorded was Miracle Milly, the Chihuahua. Born in 2011, Milly was a miniscule 3.8 inches tall and weighed in at one pound.

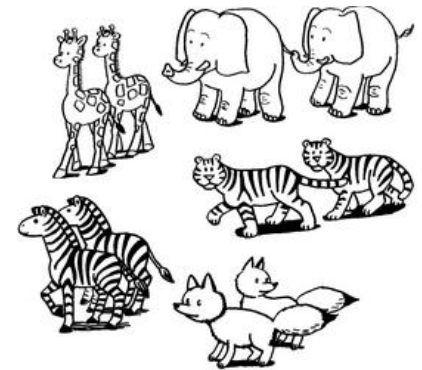

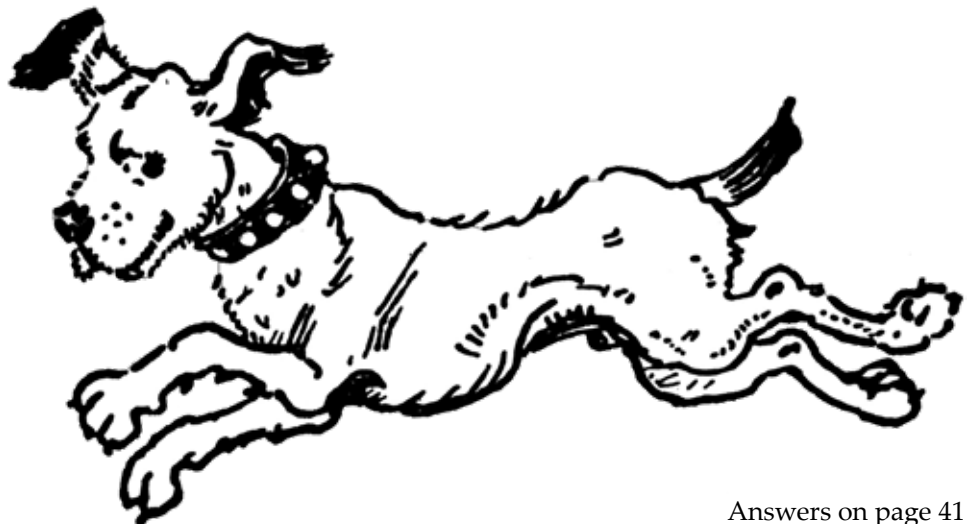
