

Policy 2022.1

Sunshine gift guidance:

- All cards need to be low cost, bought in bulk or at Dollar Tree. Members are encouraged to bring

Policy 2022.2

Weather and Board or General Membership Meetings

A policy that if the DFW area is in a Thunderstorm and/or Tornado watch or warning or the anticipation of being in a watch or warning before 9pm that night, that the board meeting and/or General Membership meeting be Zoom only.

Session 4 will be starting on June 20. We have already released the Puppy, Beginner and Intermediate classes for registration on Eventbrite. We are still needing assistants for the Monday puppy at 3 - 4 p.m., Wednesday Beginner at 1:30 p.m., Wednesday Intermediate at 8:30 p.m., Thursday Rally Novice at 6 p.m. and Rally Ex at 7:15 p.m. Plus, the Thursday Puppy class at 8:30 p.m. Wow! Train the Trainer:

We had our last Train the Trainer on May 24. It covered the different types of collars and the proper way to fit them depending on the dog. The different types of leashes and the right type and length for the activity you are participating in. We also covered developing basic hand signals. Melissa gave an excellent presentation on the types of collars for dogs from Min Pins to Great Danes. Considering the weather, it was well attended by both new members and seasoned trainers. Pam talked about hand signals and how they are varied depending on the handler and the sport. She also demonstrated how hand signals develop naturally through the luring process.

Thanks to everyone who participated and showed interest in the Train the Trainer. The Training Committee however has decided we can better use the time training new members and assistants. Of course, all members are welcome and encouraged to attend any of the training events. (See photos from the training on page 32.) Summer in Texas

Veather in the summer in Texas can be so unpredictable. Storms can be very severe and noisy. But storms any time of year can cause similar responses in your pups. I had a tornado shelter in the garage at my old home. I took advantage of treat training to name it "let's go to the closet" with treat bag in my hand and off we would troop to the shelter where all would pile in, and I would shut the heavy steel door, and all received a treat. I had auto battery lights that went on when sensing movement. Along the way I realized I was only doing this during the day. So, I said to my husband that is would be his choice if he wanted to join us, but I wanted to warn him that soon one night when I happened to wake up in middle of night, I was going to yell "closet" in the dark to train in that scenario. I didn't want to scare my husband. I wasn't worried about the pups. It happened, off we went, and all went great. Lots of treats with flashlight in hand. No, Jim did not join us! We only used this training once in December of 2015. In a new home, I decided which room would be "the closet". I designed the door

on that room to open in as it was on blueprints going out. There is a treat container on one shelf in the closet and there are extra leashes for all if ever needed. There is a new high-power flashlight in there



too and a small case of bottled water. See picture at left of all in "the closet".

Storms cause issues for Skye and a few past dogs. Logan is starting to be a little bothered. Years ago, I discovered the Calming Collar (calmingcollars.com) and became phone friends with the designer and founder whose sister lives in far north Dallas when her dog was a test dog with the calming collar. I have one for each dog. (See photo at left) Also, there are many oral things to give pups and I did not want prescription stuff. Our Golden Retriever Vet's wife, Teresa





King, recommended a calming supplement called ProQuiet and also a product called a Thundershirt. I have stuck with ProQuiet as you can give more if needed. Only Skye and Logan take it. My Rookie who hates banging noises of builders, cars, loud outside voices etc. could care less about thunder of any decibel! (See photo of ProQuiet at left).

Summers can be brutal for those of us who trial in heat. Calming Collars came up with a Cooling Collar and I have one for Logan and use it when the temps soar and we are doing outdoor searches in trials. If you were at any of the recent hot nosework trials, you would have seen it on Logan. (See photos below.) I run it over the inside of his ears also. A picture of the cooling collar is

below at right.









Summer Storm Prep

My husband and I grew up south of Houston/ near Galveston, Texas, where tropical storms and the occasional hurricane were common, so we had prep lists- one for evacuation and one for staying. These lists are quite long as there is a lot to think about and do when a hurricane is heading your way. We've always ridden out these storms.

If there is a 'good' thing about a Hurricane, it's that you have time to prepare. Tornados are more unpredictable. Still, I use parts of my old Hurricane lists to prepare for tornado season. Some of these items stay in our tornado safe place, the master bedroom closet. Other items, I know where they are at, so I grab and go when a warning goes off.



Here are some small excerpts from our Hurricane Stay / Evacuation dog lists:

- Travel size first aid kit (kept in a small tackle box)- VetWrap (2), roll of gauze, roll of surgical tape, 4" non-adhesive pads/ dressing, blood clotting styptic powder (sm), scissors, antibiotic ointment, isopropyl alcohol (sm), hydrogen peroxide (sm), wet wipes, tweezers, duct tape, Benadryl, Pepto Bismol, activated charcoal, instant cold packs, liquid bandage, eye flush solution, tick remover, magnifying glass (sm), thermometer, oral syringe, KY lube packets, black marker, travel towel, 13 gal. plastic garbage bag, exam gloves, hand sanitizer (sm), quart/ gallon size ziptop bags, zip ties, extra leash, up-to-date vet info for each dog.
- Medications- prescriptions
- Chew toys
- Collars/ harness with I.D. tags- per dog (microchips should be up-to-date)
- Leashes per dog plus one extra
- Water bowl
- Dog bed
- Food bowl per dog
- Bottled water enough for 4 days (per dog)





- Crate/bedding/blankies per dog
- Food if dry kibble, stored in zip top bags, enough for 4 days (per dog)
- Treats- stored in zip top bags for 4 days (per dog)

Poop bags (lots)

For our tornado safe place, our master bedroom closet, we have:

- First aid kit as above
- Dog bed so dogs have something familiar to lay on
- Chew toy/ bone/ Kong to redirect dogs while waiting for storm to be over
- Collars/ harnesses with I.D. tags (microchips are up-todate)
- Leashes attached to collars/ harnesses while in the safe place
- Water bowl offer water for a panting dog; kept in closet
- Cell phones (charged)
- Flashlight
- Bottle of water a case of water is kept in the closet at all times
- Whistle in case you are trapped rescuers can find you; kept in the closet
- Glasses prescription and/or reading
- Wallets/ purses

Hot Weather Warnings:

Summer is here!

onsider the temperature with traveling and walking with your dog.

Parked cars are deathtraps for dogs: On a 78-degree day, the temperature inside a parked car can soar to 100 degrees in just minutes, and on a 90-degree day, the interior temperature can reach as high as 109 degrees in less than 10 minutes. Animals can sustain brain damage or even die from heatstroke in just 15 minutes. Beating the heat is extra tough for dogs because they can only cool themselves by panting.

When walking your dog, keep in mind that if it feels hot enough to fry an egg outside, it probably is. When the air temperature is 86 degrees, the asphalt can reach a sizzling 135 degrees — more than hot enough to cook an egg in five

> minutes. And it can do the same to our canine companions' sensitive foot pads.

On an 87-degree day, asphalt temperatures can reach 140

degrees, hot enough to cause burns, permanent damage and scarring after just one minute of contact. Rapid burns and blistering can occur at 150 degrees. Hot sidewalks, pavement and parking lots can not only burn paws, they

also reflect heat onto dogs' bodies, increasing their risk of deadly heatstroke. If you wouldn't put your dog in a frying pan, please don't make him or her walk on hot pavement. Always test the pavement with your hand before setting

out (too hot to touch is too hot for Spot), walk early in the morning or late

at night when it's cooler, carry water and take frequent breaks in shady spots and never make dogs wear muzzles that restrict their breathing.





Jean Villa shared:

If you're out in the sun for your dog events here are a couple things that you can do to make your dog (and you) more comfy in the car. Roll the windows down, drape an Aluminet shade cloth over your vehicle, and turn on a battery operated fan to increase air flow.

Farewell Little Girl, I will miss you!




Champ GCHS Shana's Silver Streak November 20, 2012 – April 28, 2022

I love my boy. I miss him so much it hurts. He proved to be everything we could have asked for. He was smart, funny, driven, beautiful, high energy, had beautiful movement and LOVED being the center of everyone's attention. Our very first show dog was a dream dog.

One thing I need to point out is that Champ was the reason we found out about the dog training club. Craig met Mona O'Gorman at a physical therapy appointment and of course they talked about dogs. He explained we had a show quality puppy and needed someone to help us get started here in Texas. Mona introduced him to Donna Heishman and Donna introduced us to the club.

Champ started his show career at around 11 months following a beginner class. Donna's Sparky and Champ alternated with the same handler for several years. We sent him out on six-week tours. It wasn't long before he was winning. He first had to learn to pay attention to his handler. Our handler said he had never seen a puppy so interested in looking up and watching everyone around him. In his first Houston show he

took Best of Winners all five days and completed his championship. His grand championship came quickly too. I have to admit Champ has been in many places I have never been in Tennessee, California, Colorado, Kentucky, Kansas, Oklahoma and more. We went to see him sev-

eral places: Richmond, Virginia, for his first national specialty; Tucson, Arizona; Alexandria and Lake Charles, Louisiana; Austin, Kerrville, Dallas and Fort Worth, Texas, and many more. Before we knew it our beautiful dog was a Silver Level Grand Champion with several group placements included.

When we retired in 2020 Craig decided he would like to have fun with Champ and compete in Nosework.































He actually attended several sessions when Champ hurt his back. He was in considerable pain, and we had him on Vetprofin as we worked at finding out what was going on. X-rays showed he had an injury that required surgery. We set up an appointment with Texas A&M Small Animal Hospital. Shortly before he went, blood work showed Champ had some kidney failure. Tests at Texas A&M showed he had stage 3 kidney failure, but research showed we should be able to control the progress with diet and medication and he still had a 2-to-5-year life expectancy. The back surgery was performed in March and was very successful, but his kidneys did not respond as we had hoped. We had to help him cross the rainbow bridge on April 28. It broke our hearts. We are sure he is pain free and playing with our previous dogs, Lady and Cub, and waiting for us all to come see him.
































Book - Hair of the Dog by Laurien Berenson.





Need a new trick to teach your dog?

People often ask me how to teach a retrieve. Here is a suggestion from <u>Doggiebuddy.com</u>. It builds on the "Take it" command from last month. Most of all, have fun!

Teaching Your Dog "Bring It"



Difficulty: Easy

Prerequisite: Take It

Items Needed: Clicker, Treats, Toy

Bring it is a staple for dog training which we'll use to build other tricks upon. For example, after you teach your dog bring it, it will be easy to teach him to fetch, bring his dish or leash, or teach funnier tricks like "Bring me a Drink" or "Get me a tissue!" (These tricks are taught on doggiebuddy.com.)

Step 1:	Tell your dog to get a toy by using the "Take It" command.
Step 2:	Encourage your dog to come towards you with the toy. Click and treat if he brings it towards you a few steps. Do this a few times.
Step 3:	Keep encouraging him to come nearer to you with the toy. Click and treat when he comes to you with the toy.
Step 4:	Repeat these steps until your dog brings the toy to you each time without much prompting. Use the command "Bring it!" as you teach.
Step 5:	Put the toy on the ground and walk across the room. Say, "Take it" and "Bring it!" If your dog obeys, click and give him a jackpot!


OUR EXPERIENCE

I put Caspian's toy on the floor, saying, "Take it!" He grabs it and looks at me. I pat my leg to encourage him to come to me. Immediately, he takes several steps toward me. I click and treat. We do this several times; each time Caspian gets closer to me. One time he comes to me without the toy - I ignore him. Now he is bringing me the toy every time. I click and treat, saying "Bring it" when he comes with the toy. Soon Caspian was able to understand my command and bring me the toy whenever I asked him to.

TEACHING TROUBLE

He'll come to me just fine, but without the toy!

Don't click and treat when he comes to you without the toy - that's not what you're trying to teach. Be kind, but tough! Begin by clicking if he moves towards your direction with the toy in his mouth. Soon your dog will understand he has to bring it to you!

Jean Villa brags:


