


Training Committee News

NEW MANUAL: Exciting news! The first draft of a new manual has been prepared by the Training Committee, it has been reviewed by some of the Puppy and Beginner instructors for their feedback, and it is presently being "tested" in Beginner class by Pam White and Puppy class by Jan Bajovich.

Thank you to all who contributed ideas, feedback, and editing. Future editing as needed should be easy as the electronic copy will be available for future revisions.

The new manual will require some training for Puppy and Beginner instructors and assistants, so please clear your August 12th calendar. The Training Committee will conduct training on that day to introduce the new manual and show you the changes from the current manual. You will not want to miss this! This is not just a new version of the old manual but includes some cool updated methods used to teach the exercises, so you will want to be up to date before teaching your next class.





SURVEY RESULTS: Thank you to all who participated in the Class Session Survey regarding 6 vs 8 week sessions. We had a great response from 125 club members! Approximately 1/3 of the respondents voted for 6 week sessions, 1/3 for 8 week sessions, and 1/3 choose no preference/other. This has been a "hot" topic at our club for the past year as some members have strong feelings regarding it; however, there was obviously no clear majority. As such, the Training Committee's concluded that the survey numbers do not support a change at his time. Classes with remain at 6 weeks per session.

- New Vaccination policy was read to membership:

Proposed DTCDC Vaccination Policy

Current studies are showing that core vaccinations (Rabies, Distemper, Parvovirus, and Adenovirus) are lasting long past a year and possibly even a lifetime. At the same time, studies are finding possible reactions from over vaccinating including allergic reactions, cancer at injection sites, auto immune diseases like arthritis. Further, non-core vaccines like Bordetella and canine influenza have been shown, like human flu vaccines, to be at times ineffective.

Because of this informed dog owners are altering their vaccination schedules. Once initial core vaccines and boosters are given, many are choosing to wait 3 years, 5 years, or not at all to re-vaccinate, following instead accepted vaccination protocols such as UC Davis or Dr. Jean Dodds.

DTCDC recognizes the need to vaccinate puppies and rescued dogs that have not come with a vaccination history. Most of our Puppy and Beginner dogs fall into this category, so proof of vaccination will continue to be required in these classes. Students who may not fall into this category or who have dogs not healthy enough for vaccinations, can requests a waiver from their vet or approval of the Training Director.

Most students in classes beyond Puppy and Beginner are members and will fall under the new member vaccination policy. No proof of vaccinations will be required for those classes when registering.

The new policy for those classes and members will be that you are following an accepted vaccination protocol: your veterinarian's advice, UC Davis protocol, Dr. Jean Dodds protocol, or AAHA protocol. Other protocols can be accepted when they are published by a respected source.

The students and members not in Puppy and Beginner classes will be asked to attest to the following statement when registering for classes or signing the annual form:

"I affirm that my dog(s) have been properly vaccinated following an accepted vaccination protocol. Upon request I can provide vaccination records, titers, and/or the protocol followed or a waiver from my veterinarian."

DTCDC Suggestion Box

The board responds to your questions and suggestions placed in the DTCDC Suggestion Box.

Suggestion submitted: "I would love to see us go back to the 8 week course – especially for Puppy & Beginner classes. We can't seem to be able to fit it all in and if they miss a class they miss so much. If they miss 2 classes, they almost can't catch up."

The Training Committee recently designed a survey to see what % of the club wanted 8 weeks vs 6 weeks. The results were split. About 1/3 wanted 6 weeks, 1/3 wanted 8 weeks, and 1/3 choose other/no preference. The numbers do not support a change at this time.

The new manual will be based on 6 weeks and should help those who are having trouble getting the material covered. Obviously, when condensing material, it is important to prioritize the material and decide what is most important. We all wish we could open the heads of every student that enters our doors and dump in everything we know about dog training. We can't. We have to choose the material most beneficial to the student. Plan to attend the coming training on the new manual on August 12th. That should also help.

Conformation ... You Can Do It Too

Chowing Dogs is the only Sport that, by payment of an entry fee and with no training whatsoever, you can compete directly with a professional. In order to do this successfully, you have to have the same enthusiasm for it and the same dedication for it. And, the perfect handler is invisible. But how can that be? Well, you should be able to watch a Best in Show lineup, walk away from the ring and say to your friends, "that was an absolutely gorgeous dog that went Best in Show."

Maggie wins Best in Specialty Show

When you are in the ring showing a dog, You are an artist. You are creating a Picture because you will be emphasizing the dog's assets, you are trying to tell the Judge something. Owner handlers must practice in order to create the picture they wish to present to the judge.



So these are the elements we practice in our Conformation Class on Tuesday evening at the Club. I try to break down the elements and give each student the skill set to begin their dog show journey. We work on stacking, gaiting, handler's stride, transitions, down and back, ring patterns and placements, conditioning, and ring strategy. And we work until it becomes consistent and second nature.

Jennie's Cabela is the most titled GSP in UKC History and Hall of Fame.



Each time you enter the ring, it the same elements over and over.

All are welcome to come and participate. Or if you are just curious about the work we do, come and join us. Come learn the Winning Edge!

Jennie is showing Kip. He is an Altered Best in Show winner, UKC.

Select Conformation Terms:

Bait - A bite-size treat, perhaps a bit of liver or cheese, used by a handler to get the dog's attention in the ring and to demonstrate expression to the judge; used by show folk as a verb: to bait.

Champion - A dog that earns 15 AKC championship points, including two shows at which 3-to-5 points are awarded by two different judges (and at least one other judge awarding the remaining points), achieves the title AKC Champion of Record and has the prefix abbreviation "Ch." appended to his registered name.

Conformation - A dog's conformation is its physical form and structure. A dog with proper conformation conforms to the breed's written standard.

Dam - The canine equivalent to the word mother; the canine male parent is called a sire.

Ex-pen - A portable, wire-frame enclosure that provides a show dog with a safe, clean place to stretch his

legs and eliminate at show sites; short for "exercise pen."

"Form follows function" - The breeder's unofficial motto, it means that the individual breeds look as they do because they were built to perform specialized functions.

Gait - The pattern of footsteps at various rates of speed, each distinguished by a particular rhythm and footfall.

Groups - AKC-recognized breeds are grouped into seven categories according to the jobs for which the breeds were originally created. Sporting, Hound, Working, Terrier, Toy, Non-Sporting, and Herding are the groups that are featured.

Lead - A handler guides a dog around the ring on a lead, not a leash. A show lead is much thinner than the usual leather leash you might use to take your dog for a walk.

National specialty - Handlers/owners talking about the "national specialty"

or the "national" are referring to their breed's national specialty show, an annual event open to one breed only and staged by that breed's AKC parent club. To take a top award at the national is quite a coup for a dog of any breed.

Special - A noun describing a dog or bitch that has completed or finished a championship title and is in competition for Best of Breed. As a verb: to special a dog.

Stack - To stack a dog is to cause him to pose in a way that best displays his strong points to the judge. "Hand stacking" means to physically manipulate the dog into position; in "free stacking" the handler gets the dog to stack by use of bait, commands, signals, or a tug on the lead.

Withers - The place at the shoulders where the back and neck meet. This is an important word to remember because a dog's height is measured from this point to the ground.

When not tending to Rajar, I was caring for our dogs. Walking them, feeding and even teaching them a few tricks. My Grandparents lived next door and they raised Standard Smooth Dachshunds, which means we had Dachshunds, too (Rebel and Heidi). Over the years we also had a Lab mix (Lady- found on the side of the road as a puppy), a Dalmatian (Spotzie- who came to us as an adult and obedience trained), a white GSD (Kaye), Dobermans (Dolly, Daisy, Blue, and Copious), Rottweiler (Herra) to name a

few as sometimes the neighborhood dogs could be found at our house, too.

When I wasn't taking care of the animals, I would draw fancy Arabian horses with long flowing manes and tails prancing alongside dogs running across my paper-sack covered school text books, folders and notebooks. Also spend hours reading any horse or dog book and magazine I could get my hands on. One day while looking through an old old book called "Dogs, Dogs, Dogs, Dogs", I came across a black and white photo of a pack of Whippets posing in front of a water fountain. Shelbie and I practiced and practiced and graduated first in not only Puppy K but also in Basic, Advanced and Polishing! She easily got her C.G.C. and we were invited to join K-9 Friends Therapy Group and test with T.D.I. Shelbie found her calling! By this time we had moved back down to Houston where she became a therapy dog who went beyond walls. She knew instinctively when a human or animal needed her. From bringing smiles to the sick and injured and comfort to those who had lost everything (Tropical Storm Allison, Hurricane Katrina, Hurricane Rita, Hurricane Ike) to becoming the 'eyes' to

blind neighbor dog Angel, who had both eyes removed from glaucoma. A lover of all things baby or infirmed, human or animal. With her unique little personality, she introduced me to a world I would have never known. She made friends with everyone she met. Her story is big. I owe a lot to this dog. A true one of a kind.

When Shelbie was 6, we added a second Whippet. Enter Shane (Andauer's Ride The Lightning), a beautiful white with dark brindle patches. Shane was a handful as a puppy! But he was also a big ham. He loved the camera! And out of all my dogs was the only one that would follow directions in posing. He attracted attention wherever he went. A show dog at heart but was never shown (grew out of standard at 24"). He did excel in obedience... for the most part. He had a perfect, straight sit and solid down stay but he found it too slow. Too boring. He wanted action! (Typical sighthound.)

The house was too quiet so we soon added our third Whippet, a black brindle with white trimmed, busy 10 week old girl named Sophie (Broadstrider's Never Say Goodbye). Sophie was a wild puppy! Would climb out of her ex-pen with ease (with the top on), learn to open her crate door (from the inside) and relandscaped our backyard. She's a smart little thing but has a typical Whippet independent streak which means I have to be one step ahead to keep her attention. When we moved back up to the Dallas area, she found her calling- Barn Hunt! Out of all our Whippets, she has the strongest and smartest hunting instinct.

Even Sophie has earned her C.G.C., A. and U. and T.K.N., which was a big deal for her as she can be shy around other dogs.

Dogs for Defense – WWII: Donate Your Family Dog to the Military

During WWII over 10,000 dogs were recruited and trained for military service as part of a program known as "Dogs for Defense." Thousands would eventually be trained to serve. A patriotic public donated 20,000 family dogs to be trained for military service. Some dogs failed the military entrance requirements, were deemed unsuitable, and were returned to their owners.

The Quartermaster Remount Branch of the US Army administered the service dog program for all branches of the military. Even the Navy and Coast Guard eventually made use of service dogs.

Jean and Corky Harris moved to Oak Cliff in 1950 and opened Corky's Lawn Mower shop in 1958. The Harris family loved the quiet country feel of Oak Cliff and immediately became involved in the





They were active members of the Dog Training Club of Dallas County (Duncanville) for over 16 years and Corky was an active member of the Oak Cliff Lions Club since 1976. They were always willing to help with any dog club project and Joan trained her GSD, Rocky, in the club's classes. They had German Shepherds and Saint Bernards.

However, this story goes back to around 1942-43, when Joan's family, living in Atlantic City, New Jersey, donated their two 2-year-old purebred Dalmatians to the USA war effort. Both "Dal" and "Tally Ho" had good temperaments. Dal was an excellent retriever (at home he loved carrying huge 6-7" clam shells around in his mouth), while Tally Ho was the more laid back of the two. Both went into the US Military to be trained to serve as Guard Dogs.

Following the war, around 1945, the Dogs for Defense were returned to their original owners. This required another training session to re-acclimate the war veteran dogs to civilian life. By all accounts the dogs reacted well to returning to their pre-war lifestyles.

Joan Harris has always been proud of her two family dogs, Dal and Tally Ho, and that they were able to help their country win WWII.



Summer Cool Down Tips for Your Dog



The summer heat is here and with it comes adventurous beach trips and relaxing pool days; but it also comes with the threat of your pup getting a bit too hot on those hot sunny days. For those days when the temperatures rise keep these tips in mind to keep your pup nice and cool.

- 1. Water, water, water. While this may seem obvious, it is one of the most important steps in making sure your dog is hydrated.
- 2. Changing your walking time. Your buddy still needs to keep active in the summer but it's best to be conscious of what time their most active. Try to schedule your walks during the cooler hours—we suggest early morning or in the evening.
- 3. **Pool time for pup.** You know the refreshing feeling of diving into a cool pool on a blistering hot day so why not give your

dog the same relief. Set up a kiddie pool in the yard with some cool water so your dog can splash around and cool down.

- 4. Swimming lessons: All dogs do not know how to swim! Some will simply sink! Make sure your dog knows how to swim. Take them into the pool with you to teach them how to swim, and to find the exit.
- 5. **Be mindful of the temperature.** While it may look like the perfect day to play outside with pup, the temperatures may not be in your favor. Know when to draw the line. Too much humidity on too hot of a day for an extended period of time can be too much for your dog. Best to let them stay cool indoors.
- 6. **Keep the tummy cool.** If you see your dog gravitate towards the cool tile in the bathroom it's because it helps them to cool down. You can apply this to outdoor spaces by soaking a towel in cold water and laying it out for them to sprawl out on.
- 7. **Air conditioning on hot, humid days.** Certain short-muzzled breeds cannot tolerate hot, humid weather. Each breath is a struggle is a struggle and they will quickly succumb to the heat. Bring your dog inside...Dogs love air conditioning too!
- 8. **Hot grills/fryers can be dangerous.** Keep your dog away from the grill or fryer during and after its use, until it has cooled down.
- 9. **Grill utensils** such as grill forks, knives, metal and wooden skewers, tin foil, plastic wrap, charcoal and lighter fluid should be kept out of the dog's reach.
- 10. Wood and debris piles should be cleared out...They are a great place for snakes to hide. There is a shortage of antivenin. Many veterinarians have been on waiting lists to obtain it.
- 11. **Ground hornets, yellow jackets and fire ants** can wreak havoc on a nosy dog. Exterminate them in a non-toxic way if possible.
- 12. **Mosquitoes are the sole cause of heartworms**. Make sure you have no sitting water in your yard. Put fresh water daily in your birdbath. Aerate or keep mosquito eaters, goldfish or koi in your backyard ponds.

Hot Pavement Does Real Damage to Humans and Dogs

One mid-summer in Las Vegas, a man thought he could make it across a parking lot in bare feet.

He landed in the hospital and required skin grafts to the soles of his feet.

Hot asphalt in the summer can reach skinburning temperatures and that is no joke for people and animals.

In desert areas, where temperatures can reach 110 degrees F, asphalt can cause second degree burns in 35 seconds, according to Maricopa Medical Center.

Dogs are at high risk for this type of burn.

The pads of a dog's feet can suffer first, second and third-degree burns from pavement.

One good test: Place your hand on the road surface for three seconds. If it is too hot for your hand, it is too hot for a dog's pads.


